Sir.

I am commanded by the Ammy Council to acknowledge the receipt of Colonial Office letter No.35544 of July 17th on the subject of the re-occupation of Serenli, and in reply to state that the Council concur in the re-occupation being undertaken on the lines suggested in the telegram sated 16th July from the Officer Administering the Government of the B.E.A. Protectorate, i.e., by a simultaneous movement of Colonel Barrett's force and a force from the coast.

The Council also concur in the proposal to notify the Italian Government in the terms mentioned in Mr Long's letter under reply.

I am to state that the Council, as mentioned in previous correspondence, attach the greatest importance to the establishment and maintenance of communications with Serenli after the re-accupation, and trust that every effort will be made to complete the installation of the Wireless Telegraph Station there, and to carry but the construction of the motor-road, by as early a date as possible.

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In connection with the construction of the road, I am to suggest that progress might be expedited, and a good effect produced by the employment of whatever mechanical transport may be available.

PARAPHRASE TELEGRAM from the Secretary of State for the Colonies to the Officer administering the Government of the East Africe Protectorate.

(Sent 7.15 p.m. 23rd July, 1917)

23rd July.

I approve of re-occupation of Serenli on the lines which are suggested in your telegram 16th July viz. by a simultaneous movement of Barrett'sforce and a force from the coast.

In signifying their concurrence army Council again draw attention to the great importance of establishing and maintaining communications with Serenli after it is re-occupied and they trust that every effort will be made to carry out construction of motor road and complete the Wireless telegraph stations as soon as possible. They also suggest that progress might be expedited and a good effect might be produced by the employment of whatever mechanical transport may be available.

Foreign Office will be asked to inform Italian Government in due course that it has been decided that re-occupation of Serenli has been decided on and that it is not proposed to was through Italian territory.

With reference to the letter

from this Department No. 32112 of June 27th regarling the situation in Jubaland

I am directed by Mr Secretary Long to

transmit to you, to be laid before Mr

Secretary Balfour, the accompanying copy of telegraphic correspondence with the

Officer Administering the Government of the East Africa Protectorate, from which

it will be seen that it has been

decided, with the concurrence of the Army Council, that the post of Serenli

should be re-occupied.

3. Mr Long would suggest, for Mr Falfour's consideration, that the

Italian Covernment should accordingly

be informed that it has now been decided to re-occupy the station of Serenli/which was overpowered and destroyed by the Aulihan tribe in February 1916: that the British local authorities are satisfied that the necessary action for occupying and garrisoning the post can be taken by the military forcesat present in that district together with a detachment which is is proposed to move/by river; and that the local authorities do not anticipate that it will be necessary to ask the Italian Government for permission to allow British troops to pass through Italian territory for the purpose.

3. Mr Long considers it advisable that a few days should be allowed to clapse before the deeve communication is made to the Italian Government.

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
