Sir,

With reference to Colonial Office letter No. 41600, of August 24th. I am commanded by the Army Council to transmit for the information of the Secretary of State for the Colonies a copy of a telegram received from the Commander-in-Chief, India, with regard to the engagement of personnel and the procuring of supplies, in India, by the African Colonies and Protectorates.

It will be observed that the Commander-in-Chief, India, agrees to any such demands from Nyasaland being dealt with in India by the Agents of the Nyasaland Administration, as heretofore, but requests that demands of a military nature from E.E. Africa, the Uganda Colony, as far as possible by incidents addressed to the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, East African Force, who will in turn demand from the Government of India what is required from the stocks of his force.

As regards Somaliland, Mr Long will co-ordinate arrangements which will meet the requirements of the Government of India as to the co-operation of that force.

The Council propose to instruct Mr Long to the same terms to the General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, E.E. Africa, and will be glad to receive your alterations or additions which Mr Long considers should be made.

To - General Officer Commanding-in-Chief, East Africa,
Tenable, India to co-ordinate demands on the resources it has been decided that demands of a military nature for personnel or stores for use of Governments of Uganda and British East Africa shall be authorized to you. You should transmit such demands as you cannot meet from your own resources to General-in-Chief, India, and will allocate with regard to other claims. The Government of Nyasaland will continue to place its own orders in India through its agents there.
