Sir,

I have been referred to you by the officer-in-charge of the A.I.F. Pay office, Brisbane.

I have the honour to seek your advice and assistance with regard to the following case:-

No. 3518, Pte. John Scott Dalgliesh of the East African Maxims, at the commencement of the war resided in Nairobi U.S.A. Africa. He formerly belonged to Queensland. Soon after hostilities opened, he enlisted and has been serving with the East African Maxims. His mother resides with me, and my wife is his sister. His brother Capt. G.W. Dalgliesh is serving in the Artillery in France. From about August last Pte. Dalgliesh has allowed his widowed mother a regular remittance of £4 per month. This allowance from his pay was made by the Paymaster E.A.F.C., Nairobi by bank draft through the National Bank of India, Nairobi. A few weeks back Capt. G.W. Dalgliesh cabled that Pte. Dalgliesh is reported dead.

Capt. Dalgliesh is married but Pte. Dalgliesh was single and the only other son.

I now respectfully ask your advice and assistance with the object of securing for the aged mother who has no private means a continuance of some support.

Representations going from you to the right quarters would carry great weight and expedite matters where distance greatly militates against a speedy fixing up of matters.

Sir,

With reference to Sir Henry Belfield's telegram No. 47 of the 1st February last, reporting the death of Private J.S. Dalglieah of the East African Maxims, I have the honour to inform you that, subject to your formal approval, I have granted to Mrs. S. Dalglieah, of Elizabeth Cottage, 89 Moorhead Street, Redfern, Sydney, New South Wales, the mother of the deceased soldier, a pension of 10/- weekly, who, from the correspondence enclosed, appears to have been to some extent dependent for support on her son.

2. In fixing this pension I have had under consideration the letter of 16th April 1917 from the Ministry of Pensions, copy of which was enclosed in your despatch No. 324 of the 25th April last.

3. The new Pensions Warrant therein referred to has not yet been received here, and I shall be glad if you will inform me, when replying to this despatch, whether the amount of pension granted may be increased.

Sir,

With reference to your letter of 16th August, 1917, Number 3001/1917, regarding the case of Mrs. Dalgleish, mother of the late Private J.S. Dalgleish, East African Maxima, I am directed by the Minister of Pensions to acquaint you that had the circumstances of Private Dalgleish's death been such as to render his dependant eligible for consideration of pension, Mrs. Dalgleish, had her case been one for this Office, would have been awarded a weekly pension equal in amount to her ascertained dependence on her son prior to his enlistment, but not exceeding a maximum of 15/-.

I am to add that this award would be made under the provisions of the Royal Warrant of 29th March, 1917, (a copy of which is attached) and would be payable from 4th April, 1917. As it appears that Mrs. Dalgleish was living with her daughter and son-in-law and receiving part of her maintenance from them, she would not have been considered wholly dependent on the late soldier, under former regulations, and any payment made her for the period prior to 4th April, 1917, would, therefore, be at the rate of ^{from dependence on} 6/- weekly.
