Dear Sir,

Referring to my interview with you on the 21st. instant, I have much pleasure in putting in writing the various points which I then stated verbally.

The first matter is the present financial position of the East African Estates, Limited.

The Company's Authorized Capital is £120,000. Prior to the War 71,707. Shares of £1. each fully-paid, had been issued.

I may state here that the Company's Lease granted by the Government stipulates for the expenditure of the sum of £100,000. on actual development before the 31st. Dec./1926. and this stipulation is the essence of the lease, the Company having been formed especially for the purpose of developing the Concession which had been granted by the Government at a time when the Colony was little known or appreciated by the general Public and its potentialities were unproved.

In addition to this expenditure on the land there was also a clause stipulating that the Company should expend £10,000. in experimenting with and establishing a Bacon Factory in British East Africa. This I will refer to later.

The necessary Capital for carrying on the work of the Company had been provided from time to time as required.

and

and at the commencement of the War it had become necessary that a further amount should be provided. Owing to the financial situation caused by the outbreak of hostilities any Public appeal was impossible, and the Directors at no little inconvenience to themselves, then, and during the subsequent two years again took up Shares to the extent in the aggregate of £33,293. making the total issue of Capital £105,000.

This money has been carefully expended, as all expenditure has to be submitted for the approval of the Colonial Office, but the Company was of course unable to carry out any large schemes of development as would have been the case, had the financial position of the money market been favourable, it being the endeavour of the Directors to comply as far as in their power with the wishes of H.M. Government as to economy.

The Gazi (B.K.A.) Rubber & Fibre Estate, Ltd., was originally promoted by the East African Estates, Ltd., and an area of 10,000 acres was leased to them, but owing to the War, this subsidiary Company had insufficient funds to continue the development of their plantations.

In order to protect the Shareholders in that Company the East African Estates Ltd. agreed to absorb the Gazi Company, and the latter resolved to go into voluntary liquidation, the Shareholders receiving in exchange for their property 9,689 fully-paid Shares in the East African Estates Ltd. - 1 Share in the latter Company being allotted for each 3. Shares in the Gazi Company - and thus no Cash transaction was involved, though an extra expenditure of £3,000. per annum was taken over by the parent Company.

We have now an opportunity of disposing privately of the balance of the East African Estates Shares, by which we could realise a sufficient sum to carry us on and to enable us to keep existing plantations in proper order.

and possibly further develop where absolutely necessary.

When application for permission to issue the balance of the Company's unissued Capital was made to your Committee by the Company's legal advisers in December, 1917, I was away in Africa and it was only on my return that I realized that the essential points of our application were not adequately placed before your Committee. I feel confident that had they been put forward in the first instance, your Committee would have realized the very difficult position in which the Company was placed as regards the obligation to the Government and the financial loss entailed in not being able to carry on the work on hand.

A further matter of urgency in our case is the fact that the Company being only leaseholders, any delay in development is a serious matter, as the value of the Concession naturally decreases annually in proportion to the effluxion of time.

PROPOSED BRITISH COLONIAL PROVISION COMPANY.

As mentioned above the East African Estates, Ltd. established at the request of the Government under conditions already stated, a Bacon Factory in British East Africa, in order to assist the few settlers who in the early days had taken up land in the country, the Government and my Company being anxious to help them in every way possible.

There were no Pigs except the Wild ones, in British East Africa at that time, and my Company imported breeding stock, sent out a competent staff and erected a Factory equipped with all modern appliances.

For many years, as was to be expected in the case of a new industry where a great deal of spare work was required, the Company carried on at a considerable loss, and it was not until 1915, that the Factory became a paying concern.

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PRESERVED BRITISH COLONIAL DEVELOPMENT COMPANY.

As mentioned above the East African Estates, Ltd., established at the request of the Government under conditions already stated, a Bacon Factory in British East Africa, in order to assist the few settlers who in the early days had taken up land in the country, the Government and my Company being anxious to help them in every way possible.

There were no Pigs except the Wild ones, in British East Africa at that time, and my Company imported breeding stock, sent out a competent staff and erected a Factory equipped with all modern appliances.

For many years, as was to be expected in the case of a new industry where a great deal of spade work was required, the Company carried on at a considerable loss, and it was not until 1915, that the Factory became a paying concern.

Both the Pig-breeding and Bacon curing industries at this time appeared to have a very promising future, and it became clear that they could be largely extended to the great advantage of the settlers in British East Africa but for this purpose it was necessary to find more Capital.

My Company had already spent over £19,000, and having been primarily formed to develop land, and not to engage permanently in a commercial enterprise of this kind, on a large scale, requiring great technical knowledge, it became necessary in order to meet the requirements of the Colony for my Company to transfer the management and direction of the concern to a practical body of experts, and for this purpose they were agreeable to hand it over to such a body at practically the same amount as they had expended.

Such a body was found, and amongst them are two firms which may be considered leading firms in the Bacon Curing industry in this country.

An arrangement was come to - to hand over the concern to this body for £20,000. of which my Company received £10,000. in Cash and £10,000. in Shares, as they still wished to be interested in the success of the Company.

It was arranged that a private Company should be formed with a Nominal Capital of £20,000.

The whole matter was discussed with the Colonial Office, and the scheme was cordially approved, the great importance of the industry to the Colony being recognised, and their consent to the transfer of our lease to the new Company was obtained.

In view of this and of the fact that the proposed Company aimed at increasing the available food supply of the Colony, and of the troops operating there, the Promoters took it for granted that there would be no

In view of this and of the fact that the proposed Company aimed at increasing the available food supply of the Colony, and of the troops operating there, the Promoters took it for granted that there would be no



difficulty about the registration, and made certain arrangements to send out two representatives, one a Pig breeding expert; they have also appointed a very experienced Manager at a high salary, who is now about to be relieved from Military Service, and will be ready in consequence to take up his duties in East Africa.

The fact of your Committee's consent not being received has placed the Promoters as well as my Company in a very awkward position.

As I have already stated I went out to British East Africa at the time when it had been previously arranged that this new Company should take over the control of the Bacon industry, and during my stay there I made various arrangements for the importation of a large quantity of Breeding Stock and made several engagements with Farmers and others in the country to carry on the industry under the new management, and it was only whilst I was in British East Africa that I learnt to my dismay that permission to register the new Company had been refused.

The delay in carrying out these arrangements is indeed a serious matter not only for the two Companies, but for the Farmers in British East Africa, who are relying for the market for their Pigs on the arrangements which I made.

Therefore, I beg your Committee to give this matter very serious consideration and I trust that they will see their way clear to grant both the above-mentioned applications in order that we may fulfil our obligations to the Colonial Office as well as promises already made to the settlers in British East Africa.
