

referring to your letters of October 1<sup>st</sup> & November 1<sup>st</sup>,

respectively, addressed to her H. C. Secy, Law. since  
directed to England, I, having obtained no satisfaction

from the Governor of South Africa in spite of his  
acquaintance with the facts of the case, beg to

lay the matter before her Secretary Harcourt for  
its careful consideration.

I received an appointment to act as  
accountant respondent to a Company in which

last official copy of confirmation of said ticket,

failured to take up the appointment at the

early part of July.

At the outbreak of hostilities my principal,

being of German nationality, were arrested, & owing

to the irresponsibility of the police in charge, we

were held in New York over taken from

exert to Saratoga jail on August 8<sup>th</sup>; but, being

able to prove my identity & a familiarity to the

Commissioner of Police, I was released & allowed

to return to Kyrene the following day.

Being now the only white train on the state,

it was certainly unusual upon me to stay

the

I was taken to Nairobi on August 14<sup>th</sup> per proc of  
train & placed in a grand van for his or her  
use. I was left waiting  
at the railway station for about five hours,  
then from here to the Commissioner of Police from  
whom he had the car made to stand  
from 7.30 in the morning until my arrival  
about twelve hours later.

After spending three days in this situation I  
appealed for some explanation to Col. Ward, who  
stated he did not hear my release; but would  
in order to ameliorate matters would have me

transferred to the European side here

The now 4000 Germans were quartered

I was released on August 22<sup>nd</sup> after being

compelled to sign my parole to the effect that  
I would not go beyond the limit of the frontier

of Austria.

In reply to my correspondence regarding this

it is proved he had no right to do so, and that

he himself I have been granted a passage

to a place in the States I suppose if I can do

nothing better

here are the facts:

I, a British subject, am a British Protectorate,  
have been treated worse than me anywhere,

which were at least maintained by Government.

What I, as far as the Government were concerned,

about my position might lie on the measures  
in the field.

According to correspondence the Government  
refused to responsibility regarding my position  
my position was to entirely due to the short  
Memorandum action of the Government in refusing  
me of my liberty: such action being presumably  
based upon secretaries rule report which have  
since proved without foundation.

Letter before notice by imprisonment  
have I been given any explanation of reasons

of my services to

have following statement of out-of-pocket

expenses naturally attached to my appointment;

should also deem it a consideration to

receive satisfaction as early as possible.

would want you to leave at once for Kijabe  
(this is the name of the Station).

to mutual satisfaction.
