With reference to your letter No. 53378 of
November 20th last, respecting the incidence of the
cost of Major Darley's Mission to Me. I am directed
by Earl Arizon or Kedleston to state, for the
information of Lord Milner, that His Majesty's Minister
at Addis Ababa has reported that he has advanced a sum
of six hundred and fifty pounds to cover the equipment
expenses of the mission, which, as Lord Milner is
aware, left Addis Ababa on January 2nd.

I am to enquire whether it is the intention that
a moiety of the military equipment as well as of
Major Darley's personal effects will be borne by the Government
of the East Africa Protectorate.

A copy of the report is enclosed herewith,
Secretary of State,
Foreign Office,

has been addressed to His Majesty's Acting High Commissioner for Egypt on the subject of the above-mentioned expenses.

As for question of further payments to Major Farley on a contract salary is being suspended until a decision of the two Governments can be ascertained, I am to request that a reply may be returned to this letter at the earliest convenient date.
