From Vice-^{com} Warden, Finance Department, 19th December 1918.

My telegra on 16 October. One-rupee notes for East Africa. Controller of Currency has presumably been informed of ref, as arranged, that £1 or threepence now been issued by administrations of British and German East Africa equivalent in sterling at 1s. 6d. is being paid to me by War Office, and will be paid here as Treasury receipt, and included in Account Current as on previous occasion. Please let me know how you have come in issue of these notes.

Paragraph 2. Colonial Office urgently ask for further supply of 80 lakhs of one notes. Original intention was to demobilise carriers gradually, and it was decided that a larger proportion of notes paid to one set of carriers would be returned to them to enable for next set. Demobilisation is to be effected as far as possible, and additional supply of notes mentioned above is required as opportunity that will suffice. Thirty lakhs asked for immediately, remaining 50 as soon as possible. What are your views? Colonial Office regard with alarm possibility of not being able to meet liabilities to natives, troops and carriers.

From Vice-^{com} Warden Department, 21st December 1918.

Your telegrams of the 19th instant, one rupee notes for East Africa. Your Paragraph 1. Amount £100,000,000 issued from Treasury to Controller of Currency. Your Paragraph 2. Demand for further supply 80 lakhs one rupee notes is most urgent. Controller of Currency already anticipates having to extend powers of Credit Currency Ordinance to extent of rupees 1,000,000,000, and credit will be given, and demand now in question can only be met by foreign currency, which is not yet available. We are therefore compelled to meet the demands in the same way as we did of the Germans in East Africa, namely by successful pilfering of our supplies, and in particular such will be the stand as towards furtherance of hostilities in East Africa and elsewhere, as an embarrassment and even risk to our position as was thereby entailed. We believe that with the termination of hostilities we are entitled to ask that ye should be finally relieved of responsibility for financing further transactions in East Africa (whether representing sequeloe of the war, or post-bellum reconstruction and government) of the colony.
