I am pleased to inform you that the
French government has agreed to
the application that the question of
the death duties of French individuals
be referred to the International
Court of Justice.

The France reluctantly agreed to
refer the question to the International Court
and they are unwilling for
any other method of
settling the dispute.
The French government
are anxious to settle the
dispute by arbitration.
The result is that the
International Court
will be asked to
arbitrate the dispute.
There is no administration or
any council, so no application for
letters of administration is made to the
Court, and no death duties are paid.

The matter had been of less importance hitherto when the death duties were small, but now that ~~the~~ ^{recently} State Duty Ordinance has been brought into force imposing duties on a like scale to that in England, it has become of very great importance. As it is, the duties are collected from British subjects and not from foreigners within a British Prot., and the large Goanese shop-keeping community at the coast, not to mention other traders, escape the impost entirely.

3. There are thus two questions involved, one of the jurisdiction of the High Court and incidentally of the small fees connected therewith, and the other that of the power to tax the properties of subjects of the Treaty Powers.

4. It should be observed that it was agreed with France that in the event of a dispute over the inheritance the British Court should exercise its jurisdiction, but in practice such disputes do not arise ~~as are kept out~~ of Court by the consular authority, who it is believed in some if not all cases may be personally interested in the matter of fact.

5. Lord Wilner would be glad to be furnished with any observations on this subject which Keri Curzon may have to offer.

6. In this connection, reference may be made to the letter from this Department No. 44656/19 of 13th of August and connected corre^s, relating to the denunciation

of certain commercial conventions with the
French Govt. and the abrogation of the
French Muscat Treaty of 1844.
