

Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your despatch No. 61 of January 23rd, 1915, enclosing copies of the latest correspondence which has passed with the East African Estates, Ltd., and to confirm my telegram to you of March 17th, 1915, which was in the following words:-

"Your despatch No. 61 of January 23rd. East African Estates. Taru Area. I adhere to views expressed in paragraph 21 of my despatch No. 842 of September 22nd but if you consider that final settlement can only be concluded by further concession I do not desire to oppose. In that case the preferable alternative is to concede a wider area for selection. It would be most inadvisable to grant water rights outside the alienated area.

The bacon factory land has been surveyed and sufficient development effected. It will therefore

therefore only be necessary to embody in new lease provision for maintenance and general conditions of lease of 1910.

I advise that preparation of leases be postponed until you receive my despatch now being prepared.

2. I observe with satisfaction that there appears to be some prospect that a final settlement of this long outstanding question may shortly be concluded, and if, as I understand, the only remaining difficulty is the matter of the water supply to the Taru area, I do not feel justified in dissenting from your view that some further concession may reasonably be made in order that such settlement may be effected.

At the same time it is right that I should point out that neither Mr. Tannahill nor I entertain the slightest doubt that General Owen Thomas accepted the suggestion regarding the desert area with the clear understanding that it should be selected wholly from the dry country and that the Company would have to depend for water on what could be found within the limits of the concession. The additional demand which he has now made is in the nature of an after-thought, and compliance with it will only be justifiable if it brings these negotiations to a successful termination.

3. The amount of boring which has hitherto been done in the desert area is very small, and its value is negligible. I attach a sketch prepared by Mr. Hohley, who has an accurate knowledge of the geological formation of this area, showing the position

position and extent of the two bores which were put down by the Railway Administration. He remarks that the only point at which water may probably be found is at the junction of the metamorphic rock and the supervening shales, and that that point was not reached in either instance. The bore A was driven through non-porous metamorphic rock where there was no chance of finding water. The bore B was stopped before the metamorphic rock was reached. Therefore the only point at which water may be expected has not yet been touched, and no estimate can be framed as to the depth of the point to be reached or what would be found if it were tapped.

4. General Thomas' latest demand is in the nature of an alternative—either that he shall have the right to search for and introduce water from points outside the concession or that his right of selection shall extend over the larger area lying to the South of the Railway between the Samburu and Simba stations,

5. I am most strongly opposed to the grant of any right to water situated outside the boundaries of the selected area. I feel most strongly that the sphere of the Company's operations should be limited to its own land, and I am convinced that the possession of such a right would lead to endless difficulties and complications with the occupiers of adjoining properties and probably seriously depreciate the value of adjacent lands.

6. The second alternative is not open to equally

equally serious objection, and it may be possible to meet the wishes of the Company to some extent in this direction subject to certain modification necessitated by the condition of the land between the points named. No land will be available for selection which is either alienated, reserved, or otherwise held or occupied for any special purpose. Reference to the enclosed map will show that practically all the land on the South side of the Railway lying between the Mtito Andei and Simba stations of the Uganda Railway is so reserved and is not available for selection. The utmost that can be done therefore is to allow a right of selection at any point between the Samburu and Mtito Andei stations where the requisite area may be available.

7. Clause 2 of the draft lease will probably require some further elaboration in order to ensure that the lessees shall not so dispose of the water which may be upon their property as to deprive the occupiers of contiguous lands of the use of that which would naturally flow from the leased area on to their own ground.

8. I do not anticipate that difficulty will be experienced in preparing the new lease for the land occupied by the bacon factory. This land has now been surveyed, and I enclose two copies of the plan for your information. The Company is working the factory in a businesslike manner. There is every prospect that it will be a paying concern, and it is to the interests of the lessees to extend and develop it.

It does not therefore appear necessary at this time to impose precautionary conditions which were properly prescribed before the Company commenced operations.

A sufficient amount of development work has been effected, and it would appear sufficient to limit the terms of the new lease to the general clauses of that of 1910 including provision to ensure the efficient maintenance of the development works.






Sultan Hamud to Mackinnon Road
