Referring to your cypher telegram of April 1st on the subject of Somali Scouts, I can suggest only Saint Helena or Seychelles but you will be better able to decide destination. As valuable troops have been taken off their proper duties to act as guards, it is desirable to expedite the matter.

1. I direct you to Mr Secretary Harcourt to  
be directed to take steps of telegraphic correspondence  
regarding the deportation from the East Africa Protectorate  
thirteen thirty-three disarmed Somali Scouts.

2. It appears that these scouts have been & may  
be again intercepted and endeavours to return  
regimental authority, and it is considered essential  
that they should be deported from the East Africa Pro-  
tectorate in order to prevent their Somali brethren in  
the military bands of the Protectorate from becoming  
affected. It is at present proposed that they should be  
sent to Aden or to Zanzibar, but the Government of India  
is unwilling that they should be deported to Aden, and  
Mr Harcourt would agree to this proposal if it were  
in the interests of the Protectorate.

3. It was also suggested by the War Office that  
the Gen. M. J. G. of the Sudan and, after un-  
official communication with your Department, the sending of  
a telegram embodying this suggestion has been sent to the  
Governor of the East Africa Protectorate. Mr Harcourt  
trusts that it will be possible for the Governor General  
of the Sudan to arrange for the detention of these  
Somalis in the Sudan, as the proposal was by Sir H.
