1378. I am reluctantly compelled to accept your opinion that we must temporarily adopt a defensive role as no reinforcements available at present.

Under these circumstances what are your proposals for reduction of staff and redistribution since your S. & S. of 6th instant.

So far as I can judge it will meet case if forces now in Colony are reorganised in two composite Brigades under Tighe and Stewart respectively, with former exercising general control of all forces in East Africa under authority of Governor till such time as offensive can be resumed with aid of fresh troops. Tighe's staff would of course have to be strengthened but most of Divisional and Communications Staff could return to India. Report after consulting Belfield and Johns how railway staff can be employed. S. & S. for India.
