Mr. Norley called to-day & was informed of the decision. He represented that the vacancies for convalescents were causing him some anxiety; many volunteers at present apply (& the numbers keep going up) & since with his present it may very important to keep the number of foreign convalescents up to standard as far as possible. No closing down of appointments ^{not} was known to lead to letship etc. in absentia.

He quite realized that his requirements clashed with military requirements in this country, but he thought that if only no or few vacancies could be filled by natives who will be employed no difficulty was afraid that at present there was no chance of getting into either locally or from S. Africa.

He suggested that everybody be encouraged to alert men & candidates mentioned themselves, & let each one know where such a man to advertise for men & so take away possible recruits for the army.

With reference to your despatch No. 145 of the 4th ultmo, I have the honour to inform you that the Commissioner of Police reports that it will be impossible to obtain candidates for vacancies in the rank of European Constable from South Africa during the continuance of hostilities as in the past applications have been received almost exclusively from members of the various Police forces who cannot now obtain their discharges.

2. There are four vacancies at present which it is desirable should be filled as early as possible and I suggest that the Crown Agents be instructed to bring up candidates to interview Mr. Motley who is proceeding on leave by the French steamer leaving Mombasa on the 7th proximo.
