The proceedings of Medical Board etc. G.O.C. recommends grant gratuity of £100 and free passage to Capetown. Subject to approval has sanctioned this recommendation.

The S.O. V.H. suggests the £100 gratuity
in view of the expensive operation Mr. Harries
would have to undergo.

If the man is to be treated similarly to
a Capt. wounded in France & the
Dardanelles (and he should be so treated)
he ought to be sent to England and
operated on in a Military Hospital and
then should be to poster of his return
to pay for the operation.

I have spoken to Dr. Burgess and
understand that rough fine and delicate
work is probably required and that there
are 2 or 3 Army Surgeons who have made a
speciality of this kind of thing, that
Everything Possible" could be done for Mr.
Harries in London in that it is doubtful
if it could be done in N. Africa.

If Capt. H. wants to be sent to Cape Town
then I think then we should consult the
Admiral Com^ds as proposed by Dr. Mackay,
but I feel that we ought to

ask the Govt. that this man should
~~be given~~ an opportunity of getting off the
ship to England and operated upon free in
a Military Hospital (we could then assess
his services if any) with the help of the
Admiral Com^ds and that he should then be
given a passage back to the place from which
he came originally i.e. presumably E.A.P.

Harries, East Africa Mounted Rifles, together with a letter from the Staff Officer Volunteers to the Deputy Assistant Adjutant and Quarter-Master General.

2. The General Officer Commanding has recommended that Lance Corporal Harries be granted a gratuity of £100 in lieu of a pension under Article 1162 Royal Warrant for Pay and a free passage to Capetown.

I enclose herewith proceedings of Medical Board held on Lance Corporal Harries. E. A. M. R., wounded at Longido on the 3rd Nov: 1914, and Sub-Conductor Van Vuuren. E. A. T. C.

I would put forward a recommendation for the consideration of the G. O. C., that Lance Corporal Harries be given 10 months pay (or £100.) as a gratuity, and in lieu of a wound pension, in view of the expensive operation he would have to undergo.

The D. D. M. S, I understand, is prepared to endorse proceedings of Medical Board, to the effect that this man should be granted a free passage to Cape Town

The proceedings of the Board held on Sub-Conductor Van Vuuren are forwarded for confirmation.

Proceedings of a medical Board assembled by order of the Adjutant General's Office for the purpose of examining and ascertaining the present state of a wound or injury sustained by Lance Corporal Harris E. A. M. R.
Date) alongside on the (Day of) November 3rd 1914
The Board having assembled pursuant to order proceed to
ascertain the above named officer and find that he received
from shot weapons as above viz:-
at the point of the left shoulder the bullet lodging in the spine
of scapula whence it was removed.
A wound through the lower end of the left humerus, commencing
below, but not entering the joint. It divided the muscular
and nerve below the branch to the supra-oleo-ligament. It took two
months to heal. There is now no swelling of the limb with loss
of the back of the forearm, hand, and paralysis of the extensor
of the fingers and wrist.

The opinion of the Board upon the question here is as follows:-

...the man lost an eye or limb or
the use of a limb; or is the injury equivalent
to the loss of a limb

A Medical Board composed as under, assembled at European Hospital Nairobi
 on the 3rd of May 1915, for the purpose of reporting on
 the gunshot wounds of Corporal Barnes E.M.R.

President R. G. Turner 2nd Col I.M.S.

Members { J. L. Gillis Major E.A.M.S.
 C. L. Tyffe Capt R.A.M.C.

The Board having assembled proceed to examine Corporal Barnes
 He was wounded on Nov 3rd 1914 at Longida
 There were two gunshot wounds. The upper bullet
 entered at the point of the left shoulder and lodged
 below the spine of the scapula whence it was
 removed. The second wound was through the lower
 end of the humerus affecting the musculo spiral
 nerve below its branch to the supinator longus.
 It took about three months to heal now there is
 loss of extension of the wrist and fingers and
 anaesthesia at the back of the radial side of the
 hand and forearm. The muscles are much wasted.
 He is quite unfit for active service.
 The first wound was slight
 The second wound was very severe and no
 equivalent of the loss of a limb.
