I have the bopour to report that saing to representations made to me by the Commissioner of Police, a copy of whose affidavit is attached, I have found it necessary to deport to India a clerk of the name of Tiruth Ram, who has been employed in the Andit Office.

2. This man was engaged as a clerk on the Uganda Railway on 4th July 1913, but was subsequently discharged from that Department owing to the Political views held and expressed by him. He has hed considerable quantities of seditions literature addressed to him regularly and the Commissioner of Police is of opinion that he has been unleavouring to excite smally between the Indian population of this Protectorate and His Majesty.
