Sir,

I am directed to refer to the correspondence ending with Army Department letter No. 7615-1 (D.H.S.I.) dated the 23rd January 1916, on the subject of the pension payable from Indian revenues in the case of Assistant Surgeons and Sub-Assistant Surgeons of the Indian Subordinate Medical Department whose services are in the first instance lent to the British East Africa Protectorate on certain service terms, and who eventually resign the service of the Government of India and continue in the employment of the Protectorate.

I am now to inform you that the Hon'ble the Secretary of State for India has approved of the recommendation of the Government of India that the pensionable service in such cases should be treated as qualifying service in India and dealt with under the provisions of Article 473 of the Civil Service Regulations.

The decision now arrived at by the Secretary of State for India disposes of the question raised in Mr. Harcourt's despatch No. 807 of 21st March 1914 relating to the position of seconded men who elect to resign their service with the Indian Government and remain in the service of this Protectorate or Uganda, i.e. as regards pension from Indian funds in respect both of their Indian Service and of their service during the period of seconding.
