Sir,

I have the honour to report that, owing to the ruling in your predecessor's despatch No. 220 of 26th April 1913 on the subject of game licences having been overlooked, refunds of the fees paid for three special licences to shoot elephants have been made, the circumstances being as follows.

1. On the 22nd June 1914 a Mr F. S. Jordan took out an elephant licence, but has been prevented from making any use of it owing to his having been on active service since early in this year.

2. Similarly on May 20th 1914 a Mr H. T. Nicholas took out a licence to shoot 2 elephants, but on the outbreak of war joined the local forces and has been on active service since.
