I have the honor to report that,
 owing to the ruling in your predecessor's
^{See M.C.}
 despatch No. 230 of 26th April 1913 on the
 subject of game licenses having been overlooked,
^{лага}
 refunds of the fees paid for three special
 licenses to shoot elephants have been made,
 the circumstances being as follows:

1. On the 22nd June 1914 a Mr. J. Jardine
 took out an elephant license, but has been pre-
 vented from making any use of it owing to his
 having been on active service since early in
 this year.

2. Similarly on May 29th 1914 a Mr. G. T.
 Kitchener took out a license to shoot 3 elephants,
 but on the outbreak of war joined the Royal
 Tanks and has been on active service since.
