TELEGRAM. The Deputy Governor of the East Africa Protectorate to the Secretary of State for the Colonies.

(Received Colonial Office 12.46 p.m. 12th June 1915)

June 12th.

Answered by Mr. X...

Your cypher telegram June 2nd. I presume that the East Africa Protectorate is only responsible for the personal armaments of King's African Rifles and of Volunteers and that the expression "Volunteers" refers only to combatant units and not to persons enlisted locally for military organizations serving with all troops.

I am not clear as to the responsibility for civil officers seconded for military duties with organizations common to all units. Is the East Africa Protectorate responsible for their pay, and, if so, should the special ~~land~~ War Expenses, or the vote in Estimates from which their armaments are defrayed under normal conditions, be charged. Such officers include a large proportion of the medical and veterinary staff, which has been placed at the disposal of General Officer Commanding and absorbed in similar military departments, and also officers from various departments who are seconded for special military duties with the Transport and Intelligence Departments, &c.
