THE FOREST AMENDMENT ORDINANCE, 1915 9 JUL 15

STATEMENT OF OBJECTS AND REASONS.

The Forest Amendment Ordinance, 1915, has been enacted to make provision for the enlistment organization and control of Forest Guards and, as policing the forests forms a very important part of their duties it has been considered advisable to adopt the provisions of the East Africa Police Ordinance, 1911, relating to enlistment, control and discipline and to establish service in the Forest Guards on similar lines to service in the police.

1. In the absence of any legislation dealing with the terms of service and discipline of forest guards the Commissioner of Forests found great difficulty in engaging them in a satisfactory manner and in providing suitable gratuities for long service.

2. A comparative table is annexed.
