PLATES OF CARS AND CYCLES.

1968

The Government has decided to issue the same and  
therefore it is proposed that the same may largely be stopped  
during the year 1968 and it is also proposed to issue plates  
of cars and cycles in accordance with traffic  
conditions in India.

1. Regarding the permanency of the registration of vehicles  
and vehicles traffic in Uganda, Royal Uganda Government,  
which is responsible for the Motor Traffic Department, Uganda  
since 1951 have been asked to be advised and the Royal  
Uganda Government, 1951, will apply to the same the  
present clause.

2. The Government considers the above permanent to  
be issued to ascertain and fix the same subject  
and further consider a provision for renewing  
licences and certificates issued to Uganda to the extent  
given that Uganda will enact legislation for the  
purpose of renewing in Uganda licences and certificates  
issued in this Commonwealth. This latter shall  
notwithstanding be referred to the Police Authorities
