With reference to Mr. Read's letter of the 10th instant respecting the cost of military operations in East Africa, I am directed by the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury to state that in Their opinion regard being had to present demands upon the Exchequer balances the most convenient course would be that for the present at any rate the India Office should continue to finance the Expeditions, an adjustment being made hereafter when further funds are available; and I am to suggest that the Secretary of State for India in Council should be invited to concur in the course being followed both as regards the sum of £400,000 stated to be now due, and as regards further payments.

In view of the express terms of Section 16 of the Finance Act, 1911, My Lords would not feel justified in advancing the balance, £118,000, undrawn in respect of the loan of £250,000 under that Section to the British East Africa Protectorate in order to strengthen Protectorate balances. In Their view if further sums are required they should be obtained by temporary borrowing, but They will be prepared to consider the possibility of a direct advance by way of loan to the Protectorate for defence expenditure.

I am directed by Mr.
Secretary to acknowledge
receipt of your letter, &c:

20007/14, of the 13th of

November on the subject
of the cost of military

and to request you to
inform the L. C. S. of the

Treasury that he has
caused a letter to be sent
to the War Office asking
for the opinion of the
Army Council on the
arrangement proposed in
the first line of your letter
5 about the cost of the
two Indentures would be

With regard to the
finances of the East
Africa Protectorate,
Her Majesty notes that

3. Her Majesty communicates with
the Governor with a view to
arranging as closely as
possible the ways that

earliest possible date
and a further £50,000
in a month's time. As
was pointed out at the
last from the debt of
the 30th of Oct. in the
actual cash expenditure
on local military expenses

accounted to £130,000
and the shareage in
Protectorate revenue
has made it impossible
to expect that this sum
and the occurring military
expences for later
months can be met
from Protectorate balances.

4. The Governor has been
engaged to avail himself
of the power of borrowing
£20,000 from the National
Bank of India, but this

sum small is insufficient
in comparison with the
liabilities which have to
be met, and the amounts
proposed in the budget
paraphrased as being required
by way of loan from the
Colonial Govt appears to be
Harcourt to be as low
as he can possibly ask
The Government and will
be well probably have
the supplemented Cheque
fully safe as received
from the Govt.
