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PARAPHRASE

TRIMDRAM. The Governor of the East Africa Protectorate to the General of State for the Calenian.

With reference to General Officer Commanding's telegram to War Office of July 2nd and your expher telegram of July 6th, the phrase not understood should read "tied by budget restrictions". Position is that railway starr in incapable of making full use of all rolling stock and of complying expeditiously with all military requirements since it has been so depleted by reductions unavoidably made in estimates.

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I consider that as the military pay for all railwiservices rendered the cost of additional starr should be ment by the railway, but I am of epinion, as hudget provides will not suffice, that in first instance it sould be supplement from Tesultant railway revenue and that her ornice account should provide balance; any sums so furnished being as surmarked that, should you so direct, they can be discharged later from Protectorate funds.

Dear Mr. Bottomley,

Referring to your letter of the 9th July to Lord Percy, about the extra staff of the Uganda Railway, we note that the cost of this extra staff will be charged against the Railway but beyond that we do not follow the financial proposal.

I imagine that both the expenditure and the revenue of the Railway will be affected in all sorts of ways by the war, but I do not quite understand why the War Office should have any special interest financially in this particular item of extra staff. As long as we pay the rates laid down for carriage of our men and stores (and, aspointed out in our letter No.0165/6819 (F.1.) of 14th May last, the rates are extremely high) it does not appear that we have any further concern with the outcome of the working of the railway.

I can quite understand that, if the Railway expenditure is more or the revenue less than estimated in

the Budget, the Protectorate may hereafter ask the Imperial Government to help, but is not this a matter between you and the Treasury, outside War Office interests?

I gather, however, from the Governor's telegram of 7th July that the present staff of the Railway is much below the normal peace establishment, and I do not see how, in any case, there could be any question of recovering from Imperial funds the cost of such additional staff as may be required merely to complete the normal peace establishment,

Additional Uganda Railway Staff.

Your letter 0165/6896 F (1) of 18th July.

Our proposal was intended to put the matter on a footing which would enable an immediate decision to be taken without necessarily committing the War Office to any of the expense; you would have a free hand to disclaim liability afterwards. General Tighe's proposals as regards finance appeared likely to lead to delay and we took the first opportunity of getting away from them.

It has been decided to accept your view that the War Office is not concerned beyond its payment for services and as we must not hold the matter up for a settlement as to Imperial, as distinct from War Office, contribution the expense

will for the present be regarded as a Protectorate charge. We are belographing to the Governor accordingly.

But you go beyond the purely War Office standpoint in your letter, and we must not be regarded an accepting the statement of the position or the argument in the last paragraph of your letter.
