Accompanied by Dr. Bagshawe, I visited, at your request, the exhibit of the Kensington War Hospital Supply Depot this morning. We went through the work rooms at 20, Kensington Court, and at 12 and 13 Kensington Square, where we saw a large quantity of bandages, clothes and ward requirements. Everything we saw was beautifully made and should be of great use to the troops operating in East Africa.

I understand from Mr. Vaughan Williams that the following articles are to be supplied for use in East Africa:

At my suggestion a few bed rests and a few crutches will be added if possible.

Mr. Vaughan Williams asked if a further supply would be accepted, should it be found possible to offer it. I said that I thought it would be most gladly accepted, but suggested that it might be as well to wait until the present consignment had arrived in East Africa and had been seen by the Medical Authorities as it was very like-


that a reduction in the number of some of the articles  
and an increase in the proportion of some of the others  
might be necessary on account of local conditions and  
requirements and that it might in the opinion of the local  
authorities be advisable to replace some of the articles  
now supplied by others of greater utility in any future  
consignment they were so good as to send. Mr. Vaughan  
Williams said that they would be very glad of this in-  
formation.

I think the ladies who are so devotedly giving their  
time to the manufacture of these hospital supplies and  
the men who are making the splints, bed rests, crutches,  
tables etc. would be very gratified and greatly encouraged  
in their work if they received some official recognition  
from this Office. Would it be possible for them to  
receive the thanks of the Secretary of State? I feel  
sure that this would repute them for their voluntary and  
devoted work.


