Sir,

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt
of your letter of the 9th November, No. 49613/15, with
reference to the advances to be made to us by the War
Office on account of Military expenditure in East
Africa. The first advance of £100,000 was received
by us on the 5th November and was reported to the
Colonial Office in our letter of the 13th November.

2. We have been in communication with the
National Bank of India with regard to paragraphs 2,
3 and 4 of your letter under acknowledgment, and I
enclose, for the information of the Secretary of
State, a copy of a letter which we have received
from the Bank stating the terms upon which they would
be prepared to transfer, by telegraph, a fixed sum
of from £60,000 to £100,000 at the beginning of each
month to the credit of the Government of East Africa
at their Nairobi branch.

3. The terms offered by the Bank, viz. at
exchange of $1\frac{1}{4}$ per rupee less 2/6d. per cent, are
equivalent to a charge of 17/- per £100 and would show
a saving

4. The bills which the Protectorate Government
have sold to the Bank during the period 1st December
1914 to 31st August 1915, presumably on account of
military expenditure, amounted to £550,000, or an
average of about £61,000 per month.

5. We shall be glad to hear if the Secretary
of State approves of our accepting the Bank's ~~claims~~
for the telegraphic transfer of a fixed sum each
month, and would suggest that the amount of the
transfer should be decided by the Protectorate
Government.

Gentlemen,

With reference to your letter No. A/207 of 11th inst. and in continuation of our reply thereto of 12th inst., we now beg to say that we have heard from our Nairobi Manager regarding the proposal for supplying funds to the Government of the East Africa Protectorate on more economical terms than hitherto.

The arrangement proposed by you would be less costly to the Government than the previous method of finance by 3 d. & drafts of the Protectorate on the Crown Agents for the Colonies.

We would be prepared to make the transfers indicated by you at exchange of 144 5/32 per Rupee, less 2s. 6d. per cent in your favour, until further notice. We trust these terms will be agreeable to you.

As regards your enquiry in paragraph 4, there are no transactions of any magnitude with the general public, but we may say that ordinary remittances are usually made at rates of exchange worse by at least 1% than those now offered to you.
