Your Excellency:-

I should be glad if Your Excellency would be so good as to request the United States Ambassador at Berlin to inform the German Government that His Majesty's Government are desirous of concluding an agreement as to the release of such missionaries who may be now held as prisoners or detained by the respective Governments.

The German missionaries resident in the Cameroons and in Somaliland have already been brought to this country and repatriated, but it is understood that a certain number of such persons are detained in Uganda and possibly also in Nyasaland, while many may have been interned in the East Africa Protectorate. It will probably have been sent to India for consideration. If the German Government will give assurances as to the release of the British missionaries now

In German East Africa, His Majesty's Government will be prepared to authorise the repatriation to Germany of any German missionaries who are detained in British East Africa and Uganda or have been sent to India provided always that there are no reasons in any individual case which would make this special treatment undesirable.

**INTERNEED MISSIONARIES.****Anxiety for British in East Africa.**

Much anxiety is felt as to the safety of the large number of English missionaries who have been interned in German East Africa since the war began, says the London "Chronicle."

The Church Missionary Society has fourteen representatives there, whilst the Universities' Mission to Central Africa has forty three, including twenty four women workers.

It was stated at the annual meeting of the Universities' Mission at Church House, Westminster, that the following cable from the Bishop of Zanzibar has been received:

Official report through Admiral our men under arrest. Women continue their duties. Church Missionary Society all at work. All alive. Governor will not release any.
