In other words, the Mission were not prepared to employ in their work as teachers those who associated themselves with an Association which was hostile to both the Church and Mission.

- 2. As Your Lordship assumes, it is the Kikuyu Central Association to which reference is made.

  5. The Church of Scotland Mission has three institutions, two of which, at Tumutumu and Kikuyu, are state-aided. The third at Chogoria, in Emplu district, is not so aided and it is therefore assumed that the question does not apply to this institution.
