GOVERNMENT OVERSEAS BURSARIES (EUROPEAN)

MISS SONYA DANZIGER.

Miss Danziger, who was awarded a Government bursary of £50 a year in 1936 in order to enable her to undergo a course of teacher training in England, was accepted at the Training College, Truro, on the understanding that she would be a grant earning student and, therefore, eligible to pay the reduced fees. Two Kenya girls were entered previously at the College and the usual grant was received from the Board of Education by the College authorities in respect of these students. Recently, however, one of the Board of Education Inspectors visited the College and reised the query as to Miss Ganziger's right to be considered as a grant earning student.

- has very generously agreed to allow Miss Danziger to remain on as a student even if the Board of Education grant is not paid.
- satisfactory, and it would, I consider, be advisable to ask the Colonial Office to approach the Board of Education in order to get a definite ruling as to whether students from Kenya are entitled to enter Training Colleges in the United Kingdom under the Board of Education's scheme of training.
- 4. In view of the fact that quite a number of teachers are seconded by the Board of Education for service in our primary schools, would not be unreasonable to ask that Kenya students should be exempted from the statutory period of service in the United Kingdom if they wish to return to this Colony immediately after training.
