I fully agree that we should telegraph as proposed and I have passed the draft. Although we have warned Tanganyika that the Reserve Battalion of the Southern Brigade may be needed to reinforce Kenya and have also warned Nigeria that a battalion from that Colony may be needed to reinforce Somaliland, this is not intended to be a rigid arrangement - that is, if there should be a serious situation in Somaliland but no difficulty at all in Kenya we should probably decide to send the Tanganyika troops to Somaliland instead of bringing West African troops all the way to the Red Sea. That being so, I think that the file might re-circulate en whether Tanganyika should not be informed of this alternative possibility i.e. that they may be required to send a battalion to Somaliland rather than to Kenyu.

Please see my minute above. You will remember discussing this question briefly the other day. Although on the Inspector-General's recommendation we have warned a Nigerian battalion to be ready for a possible move to

Somaliland, and have also warned the Tanganyika battalion that it may be required to reinforce Kenya, the intention was not, as I understand it, to regard this as a rigid arrangement. In other words, if there is no emergency at all in Kenya but a demand for troops from Somaliland, we should arrange for the dispatch of the Tanganyika troops to deal with the immediate emergency in the latter Protectorate and should not send for troops all the way from Nigeria.

I suggest that in the circumstances it might be well to write to Tanganyika by the next Air Mail as in the draft which I annex for conson. A copy of this despatch should go to the C.A.I. of Kenya for information. There is, I think, no need to say anything to Nigeria about the possibility that the Nigerian battalion may be required for service to reinforce the Kenya garrison rather than that of Somaliland.

At present, a battalion of the R.W.A.F.F. in Nigeria has been warned that its services may be required at short notice to reinforce Somaliland; but a position might well arise in which, while the Kenya frontier remained quiet, additional troops were urgently needed in Somaliland. In such an event it is probable that, instead of arranging for the dispatch of troops from West Africa, which would necessarily take a considerable time, it would be found convenient to send the Reserve Tanganyika Battalion to deal with the immediate emergency in Someliland, keeping the R.W.A.F.F. battalion available for special duty in Kenya if required. I have thought it well to mention this possibility, so that the Acting Brigade Commander can be aware that while, as I have said, the 1st Battalion must be regarded primarily as a potential

I have the honour to inform you that if there is an outbreak of hostilities between Italy and Ethiopia it may be necessary to reinforce at short notice the Northern Brigade of the King's African Rifles in order that sufficient troops may be available to deal with any untoward repercussions which may arise in the frontier districts of Kenyasijoining Ethiopia.

B. Arrangements have been made for special measures to be taken on the frontier should hostilities break out, and for additional assistance to be available from the Reyal Air Force. It is to be hoped that these measures will prove adequate to deal with any situation that may arise; but should it be necessary to reinforce the military forces available in Kenya the services of the let bettalion, King's African Rifles, would be utilised for this purpose. It is naturally not possible for me to say when the reserve battalion would be required to proceed to Kenya should its presence be necessary there - though it is expected that hestilities, if they occur, will break out some time at the beginning of October. I have the honour to refer to para rach 2d(c) of the deneral Staff Appreciation at the Itala-Ethiopian situation enclosed in air hill; dualiffe-Lister's Secret despatch of the 21st my, from thic it is observed that, should military re-enforcements become necessary for somaliland, the reserve battalian of the King's African ifles for the amyika has been earmarked for that purpose.

foresee whether the military forces at the disposal of this Government would prove sufficient to deal with any situation which might arise in the neighbourhood of this Colony's frontier with Italy and Ethiopia, see my secret despatches of the 13th June and 4th July, you will appreciate that the possibility must not be overlooked of the situation in the orthorn rontier istrict of this Colony, which would be the mearest area to the possible spheres of military operations, developing on such a scale as to necessitate the withdrawal of the detachment of the 4th battalion, the implication Rifles, from the furkane District to re-enforce the troops in the Morthern prontier District.

In such an event, as there would be not re-enforcements available from the Tanganyika Territory, it is suggested the most convenient arrangement would be that troops should be made available by the Government

SECRETARY OF STATE FOR THE COLORISE, DO HING STREET, of the Sudan, where it is possible that there would not be any serious reaction, see paragraph 29 of the General Staff Appreciation, for the control of Sudan territory in the Ilemi "triangle" and of the area in Kenya now garrisoned by the King's African Rifles at Lokitanna.

- 4. In addition the Commander, Northern Brigade, has suggested that, in order to facilitate communications, it would be desirable for the Sudan Government to extend the existing Kapoeta-Lolimi road to the Kenya-Sudan boundary at Makonnen Cherosh.
- 5. In view of the fact that it is anticipated that, failing a settlement of the differences between the Italian and Ethiopian Governments, hostilities may commence in less than three months' time, I trust that it will be possible to secure an early decision as to the source from which assistance may, if required, be obtained by this Government.
