Dear Boyse,

I have been away for a few days' leave, which accounts for the slight delay in replying to your letter of the 8th of April about the audit of the expenditure on the Eastleigh Aerodrome in Kenya in which you enclosed a draft of your proposed letter to Robinson of the Air Ministry.

August 1937 (Kenya 38066/7A/37) and after seeing you on the 5th of November, I made a note on our file that you would try to arrange for the audit to be done by the Air Ministry. When I talked to you I made the point that it would be very difficult for the Auditor of Kenya to carry out the work, owing to shortage of staff, but I did not go so far as to say that it would not be possible: also, the Auditor and his staff are quite qualified to do the work if it cannot be avoided. However, the Director of

Colonial Audit quite agrees that it is impracticable for the Auditor and his staff in Kenya to do the work under present conditions.

- 3. You will, no doubt, remember that in Kenya the Auditor has already had to take on the examination of Statements of special expenditure due to the Italo Ethiopian dispute, and also of expenditure for Royal Air Force Works and buildings in Nairobi, and now it seems fairly certain that he will also have to audit statements of expenditure in connection with the Empire Air Mail Scheme, the arrangements for which are now being discussed between Bigg and the Air Ministry. All this has put a strain on the not too large audit staff in Kenya, and it really is impracticable for them to take on another large slice of work in respect of Eastleigh, especially as transfers in 1938 are going to make the staff weaker for the time being.

Following several telephonic inquiries last month regarding our correspondence with the pour demi-official letter of the 30th January 1937, No.380666st seq. - relative to the audit of expenditure on works services for the R.A.F. in Kenya, we were informed by Palmer a few days ago that the Director of Colonial Audit does not wish to undertake the audit in respect of Eastleigh in view of the magnitude of the service and the possible need of extra staff for the purpose, but that the Colonial Office had not replied officially to this effect as it was understood from Bence's letter of the 23rd 1/62/4/24 3x November 1937, that the A.M. would make other arrangements.

> There would appear, however, to have been some misunderstanding in the matter as Bence's letter, which was written after discussion with you, dealt only with expenditure of a miscellaneous character and not major works services. It would be difficult for us, especially at this late date, to make other arrangements for the Eastleigh audit and we should be very grateful if the Director of Colonial Audit would reconsider our request and agree to carry out the work on the lines already suggested. Although the estimated total expenditure is in the region of £350,000 a considerable proportion will be in respect of steel and other materials sent out from this country and the maximum annual expenditure (including these items) should not exceed £100,000.
