- (1) I agree with Mr. Freeston that if we are to do anything it should be done by an official despatch and not by a semi-official letter.
- (2) I have discussed the question with Mr. Freeston and he definitely advises against any disturbance of the 1926 arrangement until we can show that some new factors necessitate a revision. It does not appear that it could be argued that the practice which has grown up since 1926 has in any way militated against the efficiency of the Railway. The only reasons for a revision appear to be the general arguments indicated in Mr. Jeffries' minute of the 8th July above. But as far as I know, no decision has yet been arrived at regarding the unification of the

Railway Services and until it has I think that we had better accept Mr. Freeston's view and let the Railway go on as before.

I agree that if there is to be any limitation of the High Commissioner's powers it should be done by despatch, and I also agree that the present is not quite the moment to attempt such limitation even if it were thought to be desirable. I have no doubt that if Sir Godfrey Rhodes was in this country and selected a candidate for a post in the K.U.R. we should raise no objection. Again, if being in Kenya he asked the Crown Agents to select a same time, asked them to consult a specified officer of the K.U.R., who might be on leave, to associate him with themselves in interviewing candidates, the Crown Agents would, of course, willingly adopt oprocedure which is frequently employed in filling many other posts. But it

seems to me that, from the point of view of the Crown Agents, Sir Godfrey Rhodes in exercising whatever rights he has in these matters is now doing something that he has not done before. This, I think, is clear from No. 12. I suppose the relement in the procedure is the use made of Mr. McHardy. You will see from the last paragraph of No. 30 that the Crown Agents will probably be writing to us officially on the question of this gentleman's duties. I understand that he has been for some years in the East African Agency, but I am not clear whether it is only this year that he has been brought into the selection of candidates. I have the honour to refer to my Transport despatch, No.53 of the 12th of April, 1938, regarding the selection of an officer for appointment as Assistant Superintendent of the Line, Kenya and Uganda Railways and Harbours Administration.

The filling of this vacancy was recently discussed 2. by the Kenya and Uganda Railway Advisory Council, both in regard to the salary of the post and the method of selection. The Council was informed that the most suitable candidate in the Colonial Railway Services was Mr. A. F. Kirby, at present Traffic Manager of the Gold Coast Railway, but that, apart from him, there were no others likely to accept the appointment: further, that it was very doubtful whether Mr. Kirby would accept it at a salary not exceeding £1,200 per annum, the maximum which had been recommended by Council when the emoluments of the post were last discussed. In this connection I invite your attention to Mr. Secretary Ormsby Gore's (now Lord Harlech's) despatch, Transport No. 53, of the 29th of June, 1926.

PARTICULARS OF THE OFFICE OF ASSISTANT LOCOMOTIVE SUPERINTENDENT IN THE RUNNING SECTION OF THE MECHANICAL DEPARTMENT OF THE KENYA AND UGANDA RAILWAYS AND HARBOURS.

DUTIES OF OFFICE. The duties consist of supervision under the Senior officer concerned of the district to which he is posted; examination and criticism of reports which arrive from all districts, examination of consumption of fuel, cil and other stores, checking of indents, and in similar duties concerned with the efficient and economical running of locomotives and control of the running staff

QUALIFICATIONS. Candidates must have had a good education both generally and on the technical side of Engineering; they must have received a sound practical training in locomotive working on a British railway and have subsequently filled a position of responsibility in the Running Department of a railway of recognised standing. It is preferable, although not essential, that candidates should be associate members, or members of an Engineering institution.

SALARY. The scale of the salary is £480 by £20 to £600, with an efficiency bar, and £600 by £30 to £720, subject to the bar being passed, but a candidate of sufficient qualifications may be offered £600 per annum on engagement in the latter part of the scale.

The post is a pensionable one, but the addission to pensionable status of the Officer appointed will only be considered after completion of five years satisfactory service in the post. In the event of an Officer being appointed to the post on transfer from another Colony admittance to pensionable status will be governed by Colonial Regulations.
