Vacancies, 1938") as No. 7. It makes 10 vacancies for
veterinarians on our books and prospects of filling
most of these are poor until we get a better wicket
vis-à-vis the National Veterinary Medical Association.
Steps to this end are being taken by the Office as a
whole. Mr. Daubney is, however, well aware of the
present difficulties and will be home in the summer.
So that we need say nothing more on the subject to
Congo, I take it.

Vacancies for Veterinary Research Officers.

I have cancelled the V.F. for a temporary
officer (herewith), which was issued in April last
and we can eventually put by the Appts. file on which
it was registered (as No. 1) - (Appts. 27066/5/37).

I have placed the V.F. which you have now
issued - as the result of No. 1 above - on 27066/8/37 &
38 ("Veterinary Research Officers, Kenya") ~~as No. 4~~

I now find, however, that we are still short
of one V.F. for a Veterinary Research Officer. If you
look at our file you will see that the first V.F. we
registered (No. 1) was that which was issued in October
last. A little later it became generally known that
there were two vacancies on the permanent establishment
~~for us to fill~~
since Mr. Hutson had refused one which had arisen in
July; but we did not appear ever to have received the
V.F. Perhaps it is still with Proms. Dept. or with

As regards the general question, I
understand from Mr. Room (311) that machinery
exists whereby ^{the machinery} (R. 297) is notified of the
filling of vacancies, and notes made on
the relevant geographical file. There is
one on this file above the entry of No
4 in the minute sheets above. The
machinery now in existence does not
work very rapidly, however, and that
is no doubt why there is no note in
this file of the appointments of Mr.
Purchase and Mr. Spain. Nor is it
always possible to call for notes
on the files like that above No 4
hence, which of several outstanding

vacancies have been filled: all that one
can tell is that a vacancy has been
filled. In many cases of course this
difficulty does not arise as there is only
one vacancy outstanding at a time & one
can see at a glance whether or not
it has been filled.

 The old scale in the 1/80 fraction
 was of 600-840. The new scale in the
 1/80 fraction is of 500-840; at 840 there
 is a promotional bar before entering the
 top part of the new pay scale which
 runs up to £1000, a promotion into
 this top part depends upon vacancies
 being available. The scale shown for
 items 18, 42 & 66 of Head XXVII of the
 Estimates is, consequently, misleading in
 that it shows the scale for Vety officers
 going up to £1000. In fact the top
 part of the scale will apply to officers
 on the low fraction who get appointed to
 the posts of Senior Vety Officer (Items 1,
 41 & 65) now held by men on the 1/80
 fraction. When approving the
 Estimates this might be mentioned, as there

is no indication in the Memo in the
 Estimates or in the SFC's Report that this
 apparent error has deliberately been included.
 As stated above, the new scale is £500-840.

Mr. Bunker: I don't think that we have ever had a definite ruling as to whether v.f.s. relating to appointments which have been filled should be returned to the appropriate Registrar or to the Registrar of the appropriate Department; but it is now clear that once the last of a batch of v.f.s. is filled the v.f.s. should be returned to the Registry. It is usually convenient if a v.f. refers to only one vacancy to send it up with the v.f.s. of the case which also is for the v.f. - in which case we may not get it back, presumably. However, the ruling is quite clear & should be kept on an appointment file or kept seen by all in the Registry? (publy 4/5)

v.f.s. are sent back to the appropriate Registrar almost as soon as the files are returned to us following preparation of p.f. files.

Difficultly sometimes arises though in cases where a v.f. relates to more than one vacancy and proposals were in train* to have a v.f. for each vacant post (except Administrative & other annual selection vacancies).

The outbreak of hostilities changes the position however but the members of the Dept are quite aware of the necessity of returning v.f.s. as soon as possible.

Sir,

I have the honour to transmit to you, for purposes of record, a copy of telegraphic correspondence with the Secretary to the Conference of East African Governors regarding the scales of salary of Veterinary Officers, and to inform you that in view of the present difficulties attending recruitment for the Colonial Veterinary Service referred to in my telegram of the 21st of June, I have decided that, as a temporary arrangement the lower segment of the time scale for Veterinary Officers should be £600 for 2 years, then £630 + 30 - 840.

2. The new scale will be applied until further notice to all Veterinary Officers appointed after the 1st of July, 1938, and, if you see no objection, I suggest that any serving officers of this grade receiving less than the minimum salary now approved should be placed on that minimum as from that date.

With reference to the minutes on 38317/38 Kenya attached, difficulties will always arise in keeping the geographical Depts. aware of the position regarding the filling of vacancies where two or more vacancies are referred to Appts. Dept. on one vacancy form.

It is suggested therefore that a separate vacancy form ^(except in the case of Administration vacancies) should be sent to Appts. (& Proms.) in respect of each vacancy to be filled, instead of one form covering a number of similar vacancies, as is done at present.

It would then be an easy matter to make a strict rule that every candidate's file sent for offer should have a vacancy form with it (with a note (X) inserted on the v.f. by Appts Dept. "For offer to Mr. --- (date)").

A considerable time usually elapses after a man has accepted appl. & been passed fit, for his file to be returned to us to complete and the v.f. is usually tied up with the bundle all that time.

It would be an advantage if the Personal file Registry, at the time of sending the red card notifying acceptance etc. to appts. also made a note (following X above) on the v.f. to the effect that "Mr. --- accepted".

accepted & was passed fit" and returned the v.f. direct to the appropriate geographical registry for re-attachment to their file.

Separate vacancy forms for each vacancy would also be of advantage in cases where a number of similar vacancies are to be filled partly by Proms. & partly by Appto. Depts. as each Dept. could retain the appropriate forms until selection of their candidates was decided, without any danger of confusion arising between the two Depts.



The present and prospective situation with regard to the recruitment of veterinarians for the Colonial Service is so unpromising that I am giving urgent consideration to the question of generally improving the conditions of employment. In the meantime, I have reason to fear that Kenya in particular is exposed to a risk not only of failing to secure new men but of losing existing staff, ~~unless some action is taken~~ ^{special} (apart from any general measures which may later be found desirable) to revise the present organisation of the Veterinary Department of the Colony. You will be aware from my predecessor's staff despatch No. 87 of the 30th of April that Mr. T. B. McClure, Veterinary Officer, recently tendered his resignation of his appointment, and it is feared that other resignations may be expected unless some steps are taken to improve the prospects of the officers. In this connection Mr. McClure's letter tendering his resignation is of interest, and I enclose a copy for your information. I need hardly say that I do not accept his conclusions;

but the letter is obviously symptomatic of discontent which, however ill-conceived, is necessarily detrimental both to efficiency and to recruitment.

3. I observe that, apart from the three super-scale posts, the staff of the Department consists of 11 Veterinary Officers and 6 Veterinary Research Officers; all these posts are in the lower grade of the time-scales approved in my predecessor's confidential despatch of the 15th of September, 1937, carrying salaries of £500 - £840 per annum. The Department is unique among the larger Veterinary Departments of the Colonial Veterinary Service in having no establishment of posts in (or corresponding to) the higher grade of the new time-scale, i.e. £880 - £1,000; and it cannot be said that the absence of this grade is compensated by

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an exceptionally high proportion of super-scale appointments. I also observe that no fewer than 9 of the existing staff (excluding Mr. McClure) are shown in the Staff List dated July, 1937, as having reached the maximum of their scale of salary, viz. £840. ~~In this connection~~ I would invite your attention to the remarks in paragraph 8 of Mr. Thomas's confidential despatch of the 24th of March, 1936, and to paragraph 5 of my predecessor's confidential despatch of the 15th of September, 1937, regarding the desirability of providing such a number of higher grade posts in the various Services as will ensure that officers will enjoy the normal expectation of advancement (subject to efficiency) to the maximum of the standard scale without undue delay at the promotion bar.

4. I consider that it is essential, from the point of view of recruitment as well as in the interest of the Colonial Veterinary Service in general and the Veterinary Department of Kenya in particular, that adequate prospects of reasonable advancement in the Service should be available. It is sufficiently clear from the details given above that

especially as it is recognized that the Veterinary Department must play an ever increasing part in the development & economic welfare of the Colony.

that the position of the Veterinary Officers in Kenya cannot be regarded as satisfactory. It is true that the unification of the Service offers them the prospect of promotion on transfer to higher-grade appointments elsewhere, and that, conversely, they would have no absolute claim to be selected for any higher grade posts established in Kenya. But these considerations do not justify a particular Government in not making its proportionate contribution to the establishment of the higher grade. I earnestly trust, therefore, that you will consider the assignment of a reasonable number of the existing posts of Veterinary Officer and Veterinary Research Officer to the higher grade, with the title "Senior Veterinary Officer" and "Senior Veterinary Research Officer." I consider that the ratio of lower to higher grade posts should be in the neighbourhood

neighbourhood of four to one. You will no doubt appreciate the importance of dealing with this matter urgently, especially in view of the present serious difficulties in recruitment for the Colonial Veterinary Service, and I should be grateful if I can receive early intimation of your proposals, both as to the fixing of an establishment and as to the selection of individuals for promotion to the new posts.

5. It will be necessary to consider, in the light of the general proposals made in my predecessor's confidential despatch of the 21st of April for the conversion of officers to the new scales of salary, on what terms the officers now serving in Kenya who are regarded as fitted for advancement to the new higher grade posts should be promoted. In view of the fact that the officers in question are already on the maximum of £840 a year, the special scale proposed in paragraph 7 of that despatch would clearly not be suitable in these particular cases, and while the normal scale of £880 - £1,000 would be appropriate for future entrants on the new pension conditions,

with reference to your despatch no. 1106 of the 10th December last regarding the engagement of veterinary research officers, I have the honour to state that I have no objection to the course proposed by you in paragraph 4 thereof, that the post of the special research officer required in connection with the pleuro-pneumonia investigation to be financed from the Colonial Development Fund should be treated as one within the Colonial Veterinary Service and that three Research Officers should be recruited as probationers on the pensionable establishment.

2. I note that if all three officers prove satisfactory but, on completion of the pleuro-pneumonia investigation, it is desired to reduce the establishment by one post, the earliest possible opportunity would be taken of transferring one officer to a scheduled post elsewhere within the Colonial Veterinary Service.
