According to "Dress Worn as Law," which is the authority on these matters, Commissioner and Ass't Commiss. of the City of London Police wear two rows of gold oakleaf embroidery on their caps. These officers & the Metropolian Police have two rows of silver oakleaf embroidery.

I understand that Capt. Price called on Mr. Wrenman yesterday, & that in addition to stating to the above effect asserted that a similar feature occurred in the uniform of the South African Police. Capt. Price had had a copy of this draft & had apparently simplified the position by calling at Holland Yard & the Home Office.

In the course, there can be no objection to the proposal to have gold oakleaf braid on the caps of the Kenya Police Commissioners & assistants.

In the Army, Field Marshals General Officers only wear 2 rows of oak-leaf embroidery of full Colonels, 1 row <sup>one</sup> Field Officers (ie Major Generals) wear one

row of plain gold embroidery. I consider the 2 rows 7 it is a little ambiguous for a C. of P. to wear 2 rows of gold oak-leaf embroidery (the same as a Field Marshal wears) or considers the general practice of the army with regard to similar items.

It does however stand by a "Circular" Bellairs Feb 1928 says that is used by a "Colonel" Bellairs says the Col. of the Army wears the unbroken pattern gold oak-leaf on his cap. To be quite logical, the C. of P. might however a Colours hat & plumes in full dress.

It is interesting to note that other police forces e.g. before do not embroider the peaks at all.

Personally, I should think that the C. of P. & a C. of P. would be well satisfied if the peak was ~~embroidered~~ with one row of plain gold embroidery, or 4 like so-called oakleaf, with one row of <sup>in circles</sup> 1. The C. of P. wears a distinct Colonel's bicorn and unlike the home police forces, the uniform of military officers in the streets is very similar. There is bound to be two standards where both forces wear khaki, Sam Browne etc and I don't think a military and home service standard of difference.

But if of course if the S African ornamentation is gold or brilliant the above minutes are not clear.)

In the whole I should be inclined to allow oak leaves in silver (2 for C.P. & 1 for A.G.) or 2 or 1 rows of plain gold embroidery as the Governor may prefer.



KENYA POLICE OFFICERS' DRESS REGULATIONS.

Original instructions authorised by the Colonial Office  
29th July, 1927, but as now amended by the Commissioner  
of Police, 21st August, 1927.

1. TUNIC.

Khaki drill made from Crown Agents' standard material pattern No. 2134, waisted, skirted and cut long. Roll collar (opening not to exceed  $\frac{1}{2}$ " from collar stud), fastened with four gilt regulation buttons. Four pockets, breast pockets pointed and fastened with regulation button in centre and invisible clip fasteners on the outer edges. Side pocket flaps cut square. Plain back with vent in the centre seam to waist. Ticket pocket between right breast and side pockets. Whistle pocket cut in, the inner side of left breast pocket. Sleeves with pointed cuffs with three small gilt regulation buttons, worn close together. Detachable brass belt hooks for Sam Browne belt with supporting stays from arm-pit seen on inside of tunic.

The two breast pockets to have  $1\frac{1}{2}$ " pleat down centre,  $6\frac{1}{2}$ " wide, 6" deep from top of flap.

Top edge of pocket is lined with top button, three pointed flap, fastened with regulation gilt buttons. Side expanding pockets 9" wide at top, 10" deep,  $11\frac{1}{2}$ " wide at bottom, straight flap fastened with regulation gilt button.

Cuffs  $5\frac{1}{2}$ " deep at point and  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " behind.

Badges of rank worn on shoulder straps.

Force gilt badges to be worn on collar.

Badges of rank to be in black metal and regulation size.

Blue whistle lanyard worn over left shoulder.

2. BALLET.

Worn with tunic, white cotton with soft polo collar and black tie.

3. SHORTS. Khaki drill made from Crown Agents' standard H.P. 2134 cut to top of knee cap and cut wide at bottom.
4. MUTTELS. Blue Fox in spiral with black tapes.
5. BOOTS. Brown ankle with toe cap.
6. HELMET. Melaleuca pattern, cork, covered with khaki drill. Khaki puggaree, 2" regulation side flash left side; brass Kenya Police badge in front.
7. CAP. Cavalry pattern, blue cloth, with a band of blue/black braid 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " deep. Kenya Police detachable gilt badge worn in front. Chin strap black patent leather  $\frac{1}{4}$ " wide, and small gilt regulation button at each end. Plain patent black leather peak. Khaki cover for cap front. Combination of Police 2 rows gold oakleaf braid on neck, Assistant Commissioner 1 row.
8. SLACKS. Khaki drill. To be worn turned up at ankles and with black shoes and khaki socks.

NOTE. This dress to be worn only for office use.

9. GREAT COAT. Blue, pattern as issued to Royal Artillery. Gilt badge of rank worn on shoulder straps.
10. WATERPROOF. Rubberized khaki with brass buckle to waist belt.
11. SAFARI DRESS.
- Safari Tunic. A loose fitting khaki drill tunic made from Crown Agents' standard H.P. 2134 with polo collar of khaki from the neck with 3 regulation silk buttons down the front, shoulder badges as for tunic.

Short sleeves - cut off at elbow. The tunic to be open down the front, with vent in centre of back.

Khaki stockings. To be worn alone or with safari tunic.

FULL DRESS.

12. TUNIC. As in paragraph 1.
13. SHIRT. As in paragraph 2 - cut worn in at armpit white collar and black tie.

14. BRAUCHES. Light buff leather cord. Strappings of same material buttoned on inside of leg and 3 buttons to show above top of boot. Fly front.
15. BOOTS. Black "Grenleich" with high counter.
16. SPURS. Short necked 1" steel, black plain cross strap. Similar to one fitted to counter of boot.
- NOTE. Paragraphs 14, 15 and 16 will also apply to mounted officers.
17. HELMET. As in paragraph 3.

#### LESS DRESS.

18. LESS JACKET. Shell, dark blue cloth, edged all round with 2" black mohair braid, the tracing of same at point behind. Shoulder straps of same material. Badges. Regulation silver embroidered miniature cloth worn on shoulder straps.
- COLLAR. Stand up, edged with 2" black mohair braid with tracing of braid below and line of 2" square braid at bottom.
- CUFF. Pointed 2" deep. An Austrian knot of black square cord extending to 8" high with a tracing of braid all round, a black tracing or field figure on cap below.
- GAITERS. White pique, 3 small regulation uniform pins on buttons.
- OVRALLS. Dark olive green with broad stripe 2½" wide of plain black mohair braid, silver 1" leather bootstrap, 1½" steel buckle.
- COLLAR. White stiff linen.
- NECKTIE. Black silk.
- BOOTS & SPURS. Wallington boots and steel spurs.
- CAP. As in No. 7 but worn without khaki cover.

#### EQUIPMENT.

19. Universal pattern "Sandwich" belt with on braces.
- SWORD. Infantry pattern, brown leather scabbard, frog and sword knot.
- REVOLVER. Webley service pattern (.450).

HUVERSACK.

OFFICERS' EQUIPMENT - PURCHASES

No particular firm can be recommended from which to obtain the undermentioned kit, but the Commissioner of Police suggests that newly appointed officers with limited means should in the first place get in touch with Messrs. Gore & Co. of 40, Panton Street, Haymarket, London, S.W.1., the having personally ascertained that this firm is in a position to supply the whole of the essential articles of kit at very moderate terms.

- (1) 1 Pair black Greenleigh boots for full dress occasions (with high counter).  
1 pair crown polo boots. (Field boot pattern).  
1 pair short necked steel spurs, with straps for both boots.
- (2) 1 helmet, Wolseley Khaki with removable head-lining and blue flash on left side.  
1 service cap, blue (i.e. like Police Officers pattern with khaki cover).  
1 Civilian topes, white with blue silk puggaree, Police line and removable head-lining.  
2 Spare head-linings.
- (3) 1 saddle (Sutter or Whippy only, complete with girths numnah, stirrup leather and irons).  
1 Double cringle with standing martingale.
- (4) 1 Sam Browne belt in brown, not new, and well coloured.  
1 silk bag riding sand.
- (5) 1 raincoat (Ceylon Police Pattern).
- (6) 1 pair light coloured smart Bedford cord riding breeches,  
3 buttons to knee and fly front.
- (7) Thin suits of Palm Beach material, these suits are very cheap, hardwearing, cool and smart.
- (8) 1 Wolseley valise for saddle, padding (blankets and sheets and pillows).  
The Police colours (blue and yellow).
- (9) White shirts with semi-fall collars are to be worn, with uniform white ties. Brown boots with toes, are next to be worn.
- (10) All other articles of kit, i.e. tunics, breeches, puttees, Ties and Blue great coats etc. are to be purchased or obtained from the Headquarters Superintendent's Store, at the Depot in Lahore.

If any probationary officer would have a .30 bore gun in his possession, he should bring it out with him. Motor cycles are better bought in the country.



With reference to your despatch here on Tuesday last, we enclose herewith for your approval a draft copy of the Khaki Drill Police Officers Dress Regulations, copies of which, if you approve, will be available for all newly-appointed members of the Force.\*

Authorised by the Commissioner of Police and  
approved by Colonial Office, August, 1927.

1. TUNIC.

Khaki drill made from Crown Agents' standard material pattern No. 2134, waisted, skirted and cut long. Roll collar (opening not to exceed  $\frac{1}{2}$ " from collar stud), fastened with four gilt regulation buttons. Four pockets, breast pockets pointed and fastened with regulation button in centre and invisible clip fasteners on two outer edges. Side pocket flaps cut square. Plain back with vent in the centre seam to waist. Ticket pocket between right breast and side pockets. Whistle pocket cut in, the inner side of left breast pocket. Sleeves with pointed cuffs with three small gilt regulation buttons, worn close together. Detachable brass belt hooks for Sam Browne belt with supporting stays from arm-pit seam on inside of tunic.

The two breast pockets to have  $1\frac{1}{2}$ " pleat down centre.  $6\frac{3}{4}$ " wide, 8" deep from top of flap.

Top edge of pocket in line with top button, three pointed flap, fastened with regulation gilt buttons. Side expanding pocket 6" wide at top; 10" deep,  $11\frac{1}{2}$ " wide at bottom, straight flap fastened with regulation gilt button.

Cuffs  $5\frac{1}{2}$ " deep at wrist and  $2\frac{3}{4}$ " behind.

Badges of rank worn on shoulder stripes.

Force gilt badges to be worn on collar.

Badges of rank to be in black metal and regulation size.

Blue whistle lanyard worn over left shoulder.

2. SHIRT.

Worn with tunic, white cotton with soft polo collar and black tie.

3. SHORTS. Khaki drill made from Crown Agents' standard M.P. 2134 cut to fit of knee cap and cut wide.

4. PUTTELS. Blue Fox's spiral wit. black tapes.

Commissioner of Police 2 rows gold oakleaf braid on peak, Assistant Commissioners 1 row.

8. \* SLACKS. Khaki drill. To be worn turned up at ankles and with black shoes and khaki socks.

NOTE. This dress to be worn only for office use.

9. GREAT COAT. Blue, pattern is issued to rank and file.

Gilt badges of rank worn on shoulder straps.

10. WATERPROOF. Burberry sh. o, wit. brass buckle to waist belt.

11. SAFARI DRESS.

Safari Tunic. A loose fitting khaki drill tunic made from Crown Agents' standard M.P. 2134 with polo collar opening from the neck with 3 regulation gilt button. Worn the front shoulder badges as for tunic.

Short sleeves - cut off at elbow. The tunic to be open down the front, with vent in centre of back.

Khaki stockings or cro' slacks may be worn with safari tunic.



FOR COMMISSIONED OFFICERS, KENYA POLICE.GENERAL AND DRILLING.

  - (4) 1 Sam Brown belt with Frog, not new, and well coloured.  
1 Silk mourning Band. } Hawkes & Co., 1 Saville Row.
  - (5) 1 Cording Raincoat (Ceylon Police Pattern). } Cording & Co., Piccadilly.
  - (6) 1 Pair light coloured khaki cord riding breeches, 3 buttons to knee and Fly front. } Messrs. Sandilands, 15 Conduit Street.
  - (7) Thin suits of Palm Beach material, these suits are very cheap, hard-wearing, cool, and smart. } Wortham & Mason, Piccadilly.
  - (8) 1 Wolseley Valise for bedding, Bedding (blankets and sheets and pillows). The Police colours (Ties) & (Sashes). } W.H. Gore, & Co., Fanton St., Haymarket.
  - (9) white shirts with semi-stiff collars are to be worn with uniform with close imitted black silk ties. Brown boots with toe-caps are also to be worn.
  - (10) All other articles such as, Buttons, Hat-Badges, Puttees, Ties and Blue great coats etc. may be acquired from the Head-quarter Superintendent's Store, at the Depot in Nairobi.
- If any probationary officer should have a 12 bore gun in his possession, he should bring it out with him.

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KENYA POLICE STANDING ORDERS.

(No. 25) UNIFORM. DRESS REGULATIONS. (U.D.R.)  
for superior (Commissioned) Officers, Kenya Police.

GENERAL AND WORKING.

1. TUNIC. Khaki drill, waisted, skirted, and cut long, with stand and fall collar (opening not to exceed 5 $\frac{1}{2}$  inches from collar stud), fastened with four regulation buttons. Four pockets,- Breast pockets pointed and fastened with one button and domed (push). Side pockets - flaps cut square. Plain back with vent in centre seam to waist, ticket pocket between right breast and side pockets. Whistle pocket cut in, the inner side of left breast pocket. Sleeves with pointed cuffs with three small regulation buttons, worn close together.

No cloth belt, but made with hooks for Sam-Browne belt.

The two breast pockets to have 1 $\frac{1}{2}$ " pleat down centre, 6 $\frac{1}{2}$ " wide, 8" deep from top of flap.

Top edge of pocket in line with top button, three pointed flap, fastened with regulation buttons. Side expanding pockets 9" wide at top; 10" deep, 11" wide at bottom, straight flap fastened with regulation button.

Cuffs 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ " deep at point and 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ " behind.

Badges of rank worn on shoulder straps.

Force brass badges to be worn on collar.

Badges of rank to be in black and regulation size.

Blue whistle lanyard worn over left shoulder.

2. SHIRT. Worn with tunic, white, with soft collar and black tie.

3. SHORTS. Khaki drill, cut to top of knee cap and cut wide.

4. PUTTEES. Blue Fox's spiral with black tops.

5. BOOTS. Brown ankle with toe cap.

6. HELMET. Kitchener pattern, cork, covered with khaki drill. Khaki puggree, 2" regulation blue flash left side; brass Kenya Police badge in front.

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7. CAP. Cavalry pattern, blue cloth, with a band of black mohair braid  $\frac{1}{4}$ " deep. Konya Police detachable badge worn in front. Chin strap black patent leather  $\frac{1}{2}$ " wide. Plain patent black leather peak. Khaki cover for general use. Commissioner of Police 2 rows gold oakleaf braid on peak, Assistant Commissioners 1 row.
8. BLACKS. Khaki drill. To be worn turned up at ankles and with black shoes and khaki socks.

NOTE:- This dress to be worn only for office use.

9. GREAT COAT. Blue, pattern as issued to rank and file. Brass badges of rank worn on shoulder straps.

10. WATERPROOF. "Cordings" sealed pattern. Burberry shade, with brass buckle to waist belt.

#### 11. SAFARI DRESS.

Safari Tunic. A loose fitting khaki drill tunic with turned down collar opening from the neck with 3 regulation buttons down the front, shoulder badges as for tunic.

Short sleeves - cut off at elbow. The Tunic to be open down the front, with vent centre of back.

Khaki stockings and brown shoes may be worn with safari tunic.

#### FULL DRESS.

12. TUNIC. As in para 1.

13. SHIRT. As in para 3 - but worn with starched white collar and black tie.

14. BREECHES. Light Buff Bedford cord. Strappings of same material, buttoned on inside of leg and 3 buttons to show above top of boot. Fly front.

15. BOOTS. Black "Greenleigh" with high counter.

16. SPURS. Short necked 1", black plain cross strap.

Chain to be fitted to counter of boot.

NOTE:- Paras 14, 15 and 16 will also apply to mounted officers.

17. HELMET. As in para 6.

#### MESB DRESS.

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MESS DRESS.

18. MESS JACKET. Shell, dark blue cloth, edged all round with  $\frac{1}{2}$ " black mohair braid, two circles of same at point behind. Shoulder straps of same material.

BADGES. - Regulation silver cloth worn on shoulder straps.

COLLAR. Stand up, edged with  $\frac{1}{2}$ " black mohair braid with tracing of braid below and line of  $\frac{1}{8}$ " square braid at bottom.

CUFF. Pointed  $\frac{1}{4}$ " deep. An Austrian knot of black square cord extending to  $8\frac{1}{2}$ " high with a tracing of braid all round, a black tracing braided figure on cap below.

WAISTCOAT. White pique, 3 small regulation uniform pattern buttons.

OVERRALLS. Dark blue cloth with broad stripe  $2\frac{1}{2}$ " wide of plain black mohair braid, black leather footstraps with steel buckle.

COLLAR. White linen.

NECKTIE. Black silk.

BOOTS & SPURS. Wellington boots and spurs.

CAP. As in No. 7, but worn without khaki cover.

EQUIPMENT.

19. Universal pattern "Sam Browne" belt with one brace.

SWORD. Infantry pattern, brown leather scabbard, frog and sword knot.

REVOLVER. Webley service pattern (.450).

HAVERSACK. Khaki Infantry pattern.

WATERBOTTLE. Infantry pattern - (Officers).

BADGES OF RANK.

Regulation Black for general wear.

Regulation Gilt to be worn on Great Coat.

Regulation Silver Cloth to be worn on Mess Dress.

Commissioner - Crown and 1 Star.

Probationary Asst.Sapts.
