re:Market Lease and Town Hall, Nairobi.

In reference to the granting of Leases of the Market Site and Town Hall Site, Nairobi, you will remember that I had occasion to submit a report to you last year and a direction was given for the granting of a lease of the Market site excluding an objectionable term which was included in the draft submitted to me.

It was suggested that the question relating to the Town Hall should be decided by reference to the Courts, but I am advised that such a course is impracticable for technical legal reasons. As my advocate, Mr. Figgis is at present in England and also His Excellency, Sir Courtly Sorbynor, should like to arrange an interview with you at which they might be present to discuss the position and arrive at a final settlement.

Mr. Figgis is leaving England the first week of next month, so I would deem it a great favour if you could arrange a date before them.


