with reference to my despatches Bos. 175 and 178 of October 28th and Movember 2nd respectively, I have the no nour to transmit herewith copies of three further despatches from Hic Majesty's Consul at Mega: Mos.50, 54 and 55 of October 5th and 19th respectively.

You will observe that the Government of Longa have decided that the Degodia cannot be handed back by force. paragraph 3 of my despatch Ho. 175 I suggested that if. after having been handed back to the abyssinian authorities, they should agin be badly treated, and so return to our side of the frontier, to repatriate them forcibly after this would be undesirable. I had under stood, as had Major Miles and Fitaurari Ayella, that arrangements were being made on our aide to hand these people back to the abyesinian authoritie hence my talks with fitaurari Hapta Giorgis and fitaur d yella recorded in my previous despatches on this subject. If, however, this is not now to take place, it will be nece sury for me to give some explanation to Fitaurari Mapta Giorgie, who has shown himself most accommodating throughe In view of Lenya despatch No. S.A. 22645/ 1/102 of June forwarded to you under cower of my despatch No.76 of Ju and of your telegram No. 46 of august 20th. held at Government House, and A. 22845/4/15 of August 29th,
copy of a despatch on the Degodia, addressed to the Secretary
of State for the Colonies.

2. I have talked to Fitaurara Ayella, and have informed him that the Government have decided that the Degodia cannot be handed over to him by ferce, but that every facility will be given him to interview wobur Abdi and he can endeavour by peacful means to persuade them to return to Ethiopia.

Fitaureri Ayella is extremely disapointed at this decision as he was firmly convinced, that the Degodia were to be handed over to him, reference this, I beg to refer you Sir to your No 22845/1/53 of September 9th 1924 containing a copy of a despatch, of the late Governor's, addressed to the Secretary of State for the Colonies, also the Officerie in-sharge Northen Frentier Prevince's despatch unumbered of March 15th 1925 addressed to you.

Until the meeting held at Government House on August 22nd, I understood that the orders issued by the late Governor, that the Degodia were to be evicted, still held good.

Sir, that this eviction was ordered in 1924 , and in June of that year I was asked by the Officer-in-charge Morthen Frontier Province to make arrangements with the Abyesimians Anthorities to take over this tribe, reference this, I beg to my fer you to my 33/1/24 of 15.8.24 addressed to you . Owing to the Degedia having spread all over the Morthen Frontier Privince and Jubaland, and to the fact that Fitaureri Ayella way ordered up to Addis-Ababa . It was not considered feasible to evict this tribe until October or Novembuber this mar, ref this I would again refer you to the Officer-in-pharge Northen Fronts Frontier Province's unumbered despatch of March 15th 1925 . I feel strongly that we have committed Airselves to hand over this tribe . Fitaurari Ayella cannot understand why the decision of the Government has been changed, as he we chosespecially by the Minister for War to the over this tribe, ref this, I beg to refer you to the despetch of His Majesty's Minister Addis-Ababa of July 13th, addressed to you? Fituarari Ayella considers that he is now not thought a sufficently hig sweigh man to take over this tribe and that I have broken my promise

Fitaurari Ayella arrived here last work to meet Mr Jenning the Ag District Commissioner. He appeared most anxious to co-operate in every way with the Ecnya Scremment. He has already shown this by arresting several Officials responsible for the late trouble on the frontier, and in many ways it is apparent to me that he is determined to put his province in order.

Sir.

I beg to soknowledge your tempatch of August 20th, sepather with a letter from Fifehreri Rapt Seergie, which I received the day before yesterday.

I yesterday handed the letter to Fitancari Ayella, at the same time I informed that as far as I, was aware, the Government's decision still held good, that the Degodia were not to be repaired by force.

The Degodia situation has somewhat changed sages great many of them are grasing morth of the Dame river on the Abyesimian cide of the frontier with their villages in British territory. Some five or six villages have creased the new ingle Itelian frontier into the Egrehen and Anlihan country, size they have spain souttered owing to the short rains having broken and to the fact that the KAR patrols have had to be withdrawn , to patrol the new angle Itelian frontier, and to act as escert to the Boundary Commission. As I think you are aware , Sir, about three quarters of the Ourre tribe have eroused over to Abyssimian territory, and an far an I can gather, the local Abyesinian officials are mich more concerned to the eventual disposal of this tribe, then they are about the Degodia returning to Miniopia . The Gurre I understand are being assemnated in the country which was formally inhabitated by the Degodia. The Degodia are a truculent tribe and will start trouble where ever they go .

I englishe a copy of minutes of a meeting held at Government House on August 5th, at which I was present.

I was not aware of the acting Gevernor's despatch to you of June 9th to you, at the time of the meeting at Gavernment House, and I only received a copy of this despatch in your letter of July 13th, which I received at Moyele in the beginning of September.

The Military administration has now been withdrawn from the N F P. and a civil administration has substituted with Civil police, the K A Rifles being stationed on the frontier only at Moyale. This would mean that if the Degratia are repatriated, there is now not a sufficient force on the frontier to stop them returning to British territory.

As regards para 1 of minutes, I do not think it is advisable, at the present moment, to bring up the question with Fitsurari Ayella, if I do so he will only refer me to the Minister for War I would much rather, Sir, discuss the matter with you first before the matter is put to him efficially.

I was leaving for Addis-Ababa today, but on recipt of your termined of August 20th I have delayed my departure until I have received from the Hon Colonial Secretary, an answer to my 55/1/25 a copy of which I have sent to you.

I am glad to be able to repart that, ensumous improvement has taken place in this province since the arrival of Sitaurar Ayella. Lest week has been most interesting. Pitaurari Ayella called all the local efficiels and shiefs here and held a conference, which lasted some seven days. Before helding this conference, Fitaurari Ayella informed me privately of the

of the measures of raters he was about to make, the referme are the following .

- A That all target are to be gathered by the two chiefs of the Boran, Fitaurari Goddo and Fitaurari Guyu, these two will pay the tames direct to Fitaurari Ayella, who will be responsible for the paying of the soldiery.
- B That no Abyssinian soldiery are the billeted
 on the inhibitants, but in freeze ther will be directly
 there asyssinian Officers.
- C That in fusure Abyssinian solety to be severly dust will if they are found taking milk or meat from the inhabitants.
- D All refugee Boran who have returned from British territory to Abyssinia, are not to be molested, or taxed for three years, and are to be placed under the protection of Fitaurari Gedde, the paramount Chief of the Sabbu section of the Boran.

 I aw glad to say that many have already returned.
 - That no matives are to be molected at the frankier wells, all are to water at peace whother British subjects or Abysainian refugees .

Pitaurari Walds Gabriel is being sent Addis-Ababa, to explain his conduct to the Minister for War. Several minor officials have been fixed for their share in the late troubles on the frontier.

It is most gratifying to me, to see these much was od reforms at last ordered. I only hope that Piteurari Apella is strong enough to dee them carried though, it appears to me that he has come back from Addis- Ababa greatly strengtheness by the Minister for War, and with the departure of Pitaurari Walde Gabriel, he will be in sole command of the Province which will ease his task considerably.

I yesterday received from His Hajesty's Minister Addis-Ababa his despatch of August 20th together with a letter from the Minister for War to Fitm rari Ayelia, a copy of this correspondence has already been sent to you. I yesterday ham ded the letter of the Minister for War to Fitmurari Ayella, at the same time I again told him that no force would be used to repatriate the negodia. He informed me he had already received a copy of this letter some three weeks ago, by runner alread from the Minister for War, which explains his disappointment at the Degodia not being handed over to him.

The Degedia situation has somewhat shariged, as very many of them are grasing in Abyssinian territory neath of the Daus river, with their villages in British territory. I also have been informed that 5 ar 5 villages have excessed the Angle Italian boundary into the Marshan and Aulihan country, and many more are expected to do so. As you are sware Sir, very many of the Gurre tribe have crossed to Ethiopia and many of them are living in the Boran highlands and in the country lately evacuated by the Degedia. The local Abyssinian officials are worried at the eventual disposal of this tribe, as the Dirre Boran do not want them in their country, personally I am of the spinion that they will return to British territory, if they do so, the country south of the Daus and Terkali will become so vongested, that the same situation will arise as on the frontier opposite Moyale, when the Degedia will have to

return

return to Abyuninia to grass their house, beeping their villages on the British side of the frontier, and on the first eight of an Abyuninium will fine back into British temptiony.

I was should to heave for Addis-Ababa today, but I am delaying an Apparature until I hear from you, if you have any further orders for me as removes the begodie.
