certain either way, I may have mentioned the possibility. I am sure, however, that I gave no promise that it would be done.

We have only Dr Knapp's statement of the case. ~~however~~ but from No 8 he seems to assert that he had been given no reason to expect a certificate of a diverse nature. & that had he known he would not have come home. As he left his wife & family in the Colony then seems to bear out the assertion. On the other hand he knew definitely that he would not be re engaged in Kenya and in different ^{ways} of them. Why he did leave his money there if he thought he was going to get an amount elsewhere.

It is quite clear that he has no claim on us at all, & in view of former precedents he must be left to fight

the battle over his Certificate with the Uganda Railway.

I ask to say S & S has considered his letter but that he is unable to intervene in the matter, say he is at liberty to approach the Kenya Govt. on the subject.

And observe that as he was engaged in the Colony in the 1st instance, the grant of a passage to this country on the termination of his service was a concession on the part of the Kenya Govt., to which he was not strictly entitled, and that he is not eligible for a passage back to Kenya at Govt. expense
