REPORT ON HABARI.ADMINISTRATIVE:

The first Number of Habari appeared in July, 1922. It was edited by a Committee consisting of the Chief Native Commissioner, the Deputy ~~Chief~~<sup>Native</sup> Commissioner, the Director of Education, and a Senior Assistant Secretary, Mr. Spence.

In January, 1923, the Director of Education resigned and early in the same year Mr. Spence went home on leave. In December, 1923, it was decided to leave the work of editing the paper to one Officer, the Deputy Chief Native Commissioner, who has edited it since the 1st January, 1924.

FINANCIAL:

Under Head VI a, item 2 of 1923, a sum of £300 was allowed for a Swahili newspaper. Arrangements were made with the Swift Press to print at a rate of Shs:860/- for 2,000 copies and Shs:210/- for each subsequent thousand. The newspaper was sold at 30 cents per copy. The number sold has fluctuated between 1000 and 2000.

When the sum on the Estimates was finished sanction was given to expend from the Native Trust Fund, out of this about £51.5 has been spent to the end of April, thus the total expenditure up to April, 1924, is £81.5, while the total income is £459, to which must be added some outstandings. Any excess expenditure during the current year will be met by Special Warrant.

A monthly summary of the Habari Account up to the end of 1923 is attached.

PRINTING.

The printing was first undertaken by the Swift Press, a local firm, but delivery was un-punctual and the cost excessive. From January to April, 1924, the work was put out by the Gove West Press, which has proved less expensive but, owing to the pressure of other work, is unreliable in delivery, and before April 1st, because of a number of reasons, issued the printing of the new paper. It is now able to guarantee punctuality and is authorised for its appearance of the paper.

After formalities have been completed, the paper was first published on June 1st, 1924. At the holding meeting, it was decided to have the paper printed in one colour, red.

It is the author's interpretation that the paper will be considered to be successful if it can be sold at a profit. Though still in its early stages, with no experience of the market, it is believed that, with care, and no competition, there is every hope of a successful venture if the paper can be run on popular lines. It is the author's opinion that, as the paper gains popularity, the rate of issue advertisements will increase, and the rate of advertising can also be raised.
