#### MINUTES

Apart from the native question, I consider that we have enough to justify approval of this exchange — viz. the 21,400 acres of agricultural land shown in blue on the plan for <sup>or</sup> in 12446, to be surrendered in <sub>24</sub> exchange for the three plots of grazing land (shown in red) amounting together to 63,095 acres.

On the native question, I find that this is not a satisfactory arrangement as our two districts of Larkipia & Ndarakos are not adjacent.

Sir,

With reference to the marginally-noted correspondence, on the subject of the proposed exchange of land in Laikipia with the Right Honourable Lord Delamere, I have the honour to inform you that I am advised by the Chief Native Commissioner that none of the land in question is in or near any Native Reserve and that no natives have any rights in that area. I attach a copy of his memorandum of the 16th

August. ||

2. It is the case that a certain amount of criticism has been aroused by the proposal, which appears to be based on personal objections to a large landowner acquiring a further large extent and in ignorance of the facts. Lord Delamere has intimated through his Manager that "in view of so many other people apparently wanting this land, as far as he is personally concerned is quite willing that the area in question should be put to good use in smaller blocks, provided such can be done." As I have already explained, this ultimatum suggested is not in my opinion to be considered on economic or any other grounds and I see no reason to vary the recommendation contained in my despatch under reference after further consideration and reference to local bodies.

3. I am advised that the Ndaragua property which will revert to the Crown in the event of the exchange being

approved with certain additions of unalienated Crown Land is capable of division into 20-30 good agricultural holdings and should provide one of the healthiest and most attractive township sites in the Colony.

I attach a copy of a plan of a provisional scheme of alienation.

4. On the other hand the area which would be granted to Lord Delamere and which comprises 20 farms is reported to be suitable only for a sheep ranch on a large scale. These farms were either not taken up or were abandoned by the original allottees for the reason that they do not present an economic proposition unless amalgamated and developed as a single unit. I attach a report by the Acting Director of Agriculture in this connection.

5. The alternative methods of disposing of these 20 farms would be to include them as they stand or in groups in the next auction list, or to offer them subject to grazing leases. I am advised, however, that the proceeds of the sale of groups of these farms would not be commensurate with the amount which would accrue to Government from the sale of the Ndaragua property.

6. It has been represented by the Laikipia Farmers' Association that the present farms in Laikipia are so small and sub-divided that they are not sound propositions, and that those who have committed themselves find it essential to obtain extensions in the vicinity of their present holdings. It would appear, however, that the grant of these 20 farms to Lord Delamere will not prevent the present Laikipia farmers from obtaining further land as there is a very considerable acreage of similar land available for alienation in the usual way, or on a system of grazing leases. Hitherto

only 7 definite applications have been received in respect of the area proposed for exchange to Lord Delamere and these would by no means provide for the full utilisation of that area. It is my considered opinion in view of possible extensions elsewhere that it is not desirable in the circumstances to preclude the alienation of this land as a single ranch and so ensure its most advantageous development. In the circumstances I am not satisfied that the land in question can be put to good use in smaller blocks as contemplated in the proviso made by Lord Delamere's Manager.

7. The position of those Ex-Soldiers, who failed to secure farms under the Ex-Soldier Settlement Scheme in 1919 is entirely different and has been dealt with fully in Kenya despatch No. 724 of the 21st May. In any case as private purchasers the interests of unsuccessful participants in the original scheme are better served by the offer at auction of good agricultural farms than by the allotment of grazing farms none of which can be worked successfully alone.

8. Under these circumstances, I trust that you will now approve the proposed exchange with Lord Delamere.



I have just received from the Acting Director of Survey a map illustrating the lands affected by the proposals for an exchange with Lord Delamere.

2. None of the land in question is in or near any Native Reserve or proposed Native Reserve, and no natives have any rights over any of it. Any natives who may have been found recently on the farms in the northern block were trespassers.

Your Telegram S. 22957/5 dated 14th, instant.

In reference to your above-quoted telegram, I say at this outset that I have not made that very thorough examination of the land in question that I should like to have done remembering the circumstances and the need for more than ordinary care in the matter.

However, from what I have been able to see on my recent visit and from what I know of the area from previous visits I am able to report with confidence.

(1) The exchange is undoubtedly suitable to Lord Delamere in that he owns the live stock which enables him to utilise the area to be given in exchange for Ndaramus.

(2) The Ndaramus land is most certainly not suitable for subdivision into small farms of from 400 to 600 acre units. District Committee in reporting adversely regarding the subdivision of Ndaramus into "small farms" took as the average size of a small farm. Ndaramus is subdivided into areas of from 1500 to 1700 acres depending on the proportions of cultivable arable. This I understand is what was intended by the Committee and I agree.

(3) The arrangements as revealed to me by the Commissioner of Lands struck me as fair and reasonable. I would unhesitatingly value the available land at at least twice the value of the Ngong Valley land which is the best of the offered in exchange. The usual adjustment from 6 cents per acre to 20 cents per acre and the development conditions of the proposed exchange could from a business and development point of view. It is presumed that any rental adjustment in the future will not affect the new lands in this exchange, if they do the proposal to surrender Ndaramus for 43,000 acres at the rental of 6 cents per acre should preferably be chosen.

(4) I would recommend Government to conclude the business if it is merely the question of value which can be left to arbitration.


