I have the honour to refer to your telegram of the 5th of August relative to the proposed visit of Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of York and party to this Colony and to the Protectorate of Uganda during the months of December and January next, and also to my telegrams of the 9th of August and of the 14th of August.

2. I enclose in an annexure to this despatch a provisional programme for the visit of Their Royal Highnesses to Kenya together with some brief explanatory notes and a few maps. I would suggest that I may be supplied with the names of any residents in Kenya whom Their Royal Highnesses may desire should be honoured with an invitation to meet them.

3. Requests have been received from public bodies and Associations in the Colony inviting Their Royal Highnesses to take part in various functions. To these I will reply that it is impossible to commit His Royal Highness at this stage, but that in view of the expressed wish that ceremonial is

to be reduced to a minimum, it is improbable that he will be able to accept more than one or two of such invitations. I would, however, venture to express the hope that Their Royal Highnesses may be able to accept an invitation from the Mayor and Council of Nairobi to open the new City Park.

The wishes of Their Royal Highnesses in regard to ceremonial during the visit will, of course, be fully respected and complied with, but it will, I am sure, be recognised that the visit is a great event in the history of this young Colony, and that its inhabitants of all races are very sensible of the honour which is being conferred and will desire to demonstrate their loyalty to the Throne in the persons of Their Royal Highnesses.

It is a matter of personal regret to myself, and indeed to the Colony in general, that the time at the disposal of the Royal party will not permit an extended visit to parts of the country other than those to which the annexed programme relates.

5. I shall be glad if notification by telegram of the approval of the programme, or of any alterations therein, may be sent to me as early as possible to enable me to confirm the provisional arrangements already made.

TIME OF ARRIVAL.

It is hoped that the steamer may arrive between dawn and breakfast time.

CEREMONIAL.

Mombasa. It is assumed that His Royal Highness will land in uniform.

The Governor will meet Their Royal Highnesses at Mombasa.

There should be a garden party at Mombasa at which the Duke and Duchess will meet leading Arabs and Indians.

This will complete Mombasa.

En route to Nairobi. There will be no receptions or introductions. The country between Mombasa and Nairobi is thinly populated and almost unoccupied. Seats will be arranged in front of the locomotive while crossing Athi Plains to see the troops of game; this is always of great interest.

Nairobi. Arrive in uniform; inspect Guard of Honour of King's African Rifles; and receive three or four quite short addresses of welcome. Short collective reply to be made by His Royal Highness. These are the only two occasions on which the Duke need wear uniform in the Colony. The public is very keenly looking forward to the Royal visit and I am sure Their Royal Highnesses will gladly allow themselves to be seen. The only official arrangements are the opening of the new City Park on one afternoon, and a Garden Party at Government House next day. Dinners will be unofficial. The Duke to visit Nairobi Club for an hour one evening; and there will be a small and unofficial dance at Muthaiga, the Country Club.

SAFARI

There will be no official receptions, though the Governor will be introduced to residents at various times and receive and say a few words to groups at various places. There will be a small party.

Royal  
Community.

The party will be accompanied by, and will be provided with, a number of natives, gunbearers, skinners, porters, etc., who will be engaged in the shooting of game, and the preparation of skins for export. The party will be provided with rifles, shot guns and ammunition. A wide variety of rifles and guns if desired. Trained natives, gunbearers and skinners will be available. If trophies are to be kept, a supply of preservative and insecticide should be brought; Rowland Ward should be consulted.

Two professional white hunters will offer their services. These men are of great experience and skill and may be thoroughly trusted in every respect. Binoculars and cameras should be brought.

TRANSPORT. All transport by rail and steamer will be arranged by the Uganda Railway Administration. The party will travel in the Governor's train. The

General Manager will if advisable be on the train throughout. A pilot engine will be provided. All motor transport and ponies and mules for the Camp will be provided. During motor journeys lunch and tea is arranged sometimes by the roadside and sometimes at the farms of residents whom the Duke may care to meet.

#### CAMP EQUIPMENT.

All tents, camp beds and tables, and everything of that nature will be provided. The party may prefer to bring their own bedding, that is sheets, pillows and blankets; but if desired, they can quite easily be supplied from Government House.

#### COMMISSARIAT AND WINES.

The party may care to bring with them any cigarettes or cigars, or wines or champagne which they habitually use and may prefer, but of course a good selection and supply is available in the country and will be most willingly provided. All other commissariat is being supplied.

#### CLOTHES.

Every member of the party should be provided with 2 good topees (or helmets), one white for town use and one khaki pith for safari, or alternatively, double terais. Besides usual clothing for dinners and ceremonies, it is essential to bring warm clothing, and cloaks and rugs. Part of safari will be close to the equator, but much is at high altitude (the Railway between Nakuru and Eldoret reaches 9,130 feet) and it is very cold motoring in morning and evening. This is important.

At Mombasa and on Lake Albert it will be advisable to have thin clothing; or tussore or white ducks are preferable.

#### MAPS.

A number of maps are sent. Six copies of a useful road map are included so that each member

may have one.

### DOCTOR.

A doctor will always be at hand in case of any unforeseen emergency.

### SERVANTS.

Capable and trustworthy native personal servants, gunbearers, etc., will be provided. Lady Coryndon's maid is at the disposal of Her Royal Highness's party.

### FISHING.

Fairly good coarse fishing is to be had on the Guaso Nyiro River at Archer's Post, should any of the party care to camp there. Tackle suitable for sea trout or small salmon is used. There is very good trout fishing from Mjeri; brown and rainbow trout up to 7 lbs. In case His Royal Highness does not care to burden himself with rod cases etc., there is much good tackle available in the Colony, which will gladly be placed at the disposal of the party.

### MOUNT KENYA.

The route will take the party completely round the Mountain, with fine views of the snow peaks. If the Duke, or any member of his party, would care to climb the lower slopes or up to the Frozen Lake, this can be arranged without difficulty.




# ROAD MAP OF KENYA COLONY


