As regards the Governor's proposal to bore for wells, I pointed out that the scheme was not certain of success and that it tended to admit the possibility of receiving refugees.

We agreed that we must endeavour to keep out both Somalis and on-Somalis. The question then arose what it should be done.

(1) League of Nations.

It was pointed out that a complaint framed on a purely humanitarian ground would be spoilt by our present policy of asking them to go back with great hardship. It then in the presence of the League of Nations to meet them on their own soil. Also the League of Nations would have to decide where the boundary lay, and we also had to agree that it had not yet been agreed upon.

It was agreed that the presentation of the case would give difficulty, but that, as the Abyssinians were certainly not welcome the conference of their anti-government to the League of Nations, it might be very useful as a threat.

(2) Direct pressure at Adis Abeba.

It was admitted that such
