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Sir,

I am directed by Mr. Secretary Ramsay MacDonald
to acknowledge the receipt of your letter ^{for} 27812/24 of the
24th ultimo, relative to the position of the subjects of
the Sultan of Zanzibar in Italian Somaliland under
article 8 of the Jubaland Convention.

2. Article 8 of that convention provides that all
treaties, conventions and agreements between the Government
of His Britannic Majesty and the Government of His Majesty
the King of Italy applicable to the Italian Colony of
Italian Somaliland and at present in force shall be extended
to the territory now transferred in accordance with the
present agreement.

3. As the Secretary of State for the Colonies is aware,
the agreement between Great Britain and Italy of 13th
January, 1905, deals with the purchase by the Italian
Government of all the sovereign and other rights of the
Sultan of Zanzibar over the towns, ports and territory
of the Benadir Coast which had previously been leased to
Italy, and provides inter alia that on the payment of one
hundred and forty-four thousand pounds by the Italian
Government all rights specially reserved to the Sultan of
Zanzibar under the agreements of 1892 and 1896 shall cease.
