I have laid before the ~~Lords Commissioners~~ of His Majesty's Treasury Sir H.G. Read's letter of the 26th March last (13132/1924) with enclosures from the Governor of the Tanganyika Territory on the subject of a proposed revision of the salaries of Asiatic Subordinate Medical Staff in the East African Dependencies.

 My Lords note that whilst the proposals, which formed the subject of Sir H. Byatt's despatch of the 26th June 1923 (874/1/33) involve no increase in the present emoluments of existing grades, which are regarded as quite adequate to attract a sufficient supply of suitable candidates, they provide for the creation of a limited number of higher posts to which promotion would be made by merit, certain modifications in the present terms of service, to make them identical with those of Asiatic clerical Staffs (with the exception that the Compounder grade will not be

pensionable), and for the grant of pensionable status to Sub Assistant Surgeons in Tanganyika, a privilege already enjoyed by that grade in Kenya and Uganda.

In reply I am to request you to inform the Secretary of State for the Colonies that My Lords are prepared to agree in principle with the above proposals and They sanction the following scales which may be introduced with effect from the 1st January last:-

Assistant Surgeon (new grade)	£360 by 18 to £420 per annum, (inclusive).
Senior Sub Assistant Surgeon (new grade)	£360 by 15 to £380 per annum (inclusive).
Sub Assistant Surgeon	£240 by 12 to £300 per annum (inclusive).
Compounder	£150 by 12 £216 per annum (inclusive) (to enter the scale at £186 if certified).

My Lords assume that They will be consulted in due course as regards the number of posts of Assistant Surgeon and Senior Sub Assistant Surgeon to be

be created in the Tanganyika-Territory.

The point of entry into the new scales in all cases should be the incremental point equal to or not more above the existing total emoluments of the offices concerned, any resulting excess over the maximum being regarded as a non-pensionable allowance.

3 The D.C. of the Treasury wish to be committed in due course as ^{to} the number of posts of Sub Ass't Surgeon to be created, & you will be asked to furnish me with information on this point.

4. I presume that offer recorded from the Indian Subordnate Medical Deptt will continue to be paid at double their Madras rates unless the new scales are in any case more favourable.



1. I am to refer to your letter No. M. 8954/22 of the 15th of March, 1923, and connected correspondence on the subject of the salaries of subordinate medical staff in the East African Dependencies.

2. I am to request you to inform Lord Oliver that Mr. Thomas has now approved the introduction of the following scales of salary in Kenya, Uganda and the T.T., with effect from the 1st of January 1924.

1924 :-

Assistant Surgeon £360 by £18 to £420
Senior Sub-Assistant Surgeon £300 by £15 to £360
Sub-Assistant Surgeon £240 by £12 to £300
- Compounder £150 by £12 to £216.

In Kenya, however, there will be no grade of Senior Sub-Assistant Surgeon, and Compounders will remain on their existing scale of £90 by £6 to £144.

3. The Governors have been informed that Mr. Thomas premises that officers seconded from the Indian Subordinate Medical Deptt. will continue to be paid at double their Indian rates unless the new scales are in any case more favourable.
