I have the honour to report that I arrived in London from Cape Town on July 14th.

2. After sending you my report from Tanganyika dated Dar-es-Salaam 25th April, I proceeded to

Nyasaland via Beira and there I met Dr. Jones and his

Commission who had been on a tour to the northern
part of the Protectorate. From Nyasaland I went with
the Commission to Southern Rhodesia and then to

Northern Rhodesia. On June 9th the Missionary

Conference held at Kafue marked the termination of the
official tour of the Phelps Stokes Commission to East

Africa under Dr. Jones.

While Dr. Jones and other members of his Commission went to Natal and other parts of the Union, I visited Bechuanaland and Basutoland, according to your instructions.

On June 27th I embarked at Cape Town for home, together with the following members of the

Conference

Before leaving Nyasaland Dr. Jones submitted certain recommendations for the development of native education to the head of the Government.

- Visit to Southern Rhedesia. In order to see as much as possible of actual school work carried on amongst the native population, the Commiss broke up into small parties and visited differe parts of the Colony. Between the time given to the northern part of the Colony and the southern districts, Dr. Jones and the Commission stayed for about a week at Salisbury where he met His Excellency the Governor, the Colonial Secretary, the Chief Native Commissioner and a number of other officials on various occasions, and was given every possible opportunity to acquaint himself with the Government's policy regarding the native. At an annual Missionary Conference Dr. Jones and his Commission met representatives of the Missionary Societies working in the Colony. Members of the Commission visited both the interesting Government schools for natives near Salisbury and near Bulawayo.
- 5. Visit to Northern Rhodesia. Dr. Jones and the American Commission attended a special Missionary

information which I am supplying to Dr. Jones and I have been very fortunate in obtaining promises of special reports from the following members of the Phelps Stokes Education Commission:- Mr. Aggrey - the native point of view; Dr. Garfield Williams - mission schools; Dr. Shantz - Agriculture; Mrs. Vischer - Education of African women.

I further hope to include in my report copies of the recommendations of Dr. Jones, handed by him to the heads of the Government in the various Dependencies visited by the Commission.

I have obtained most of the information asked for in the questionnaires drawn up by Sir Frederick Lugard and have a fairly representative collection of school text-books used in the different countries. My replies to these questionnaires and a report on school text-books will be submitted as soon as I am in possession of all the information.

I am enclosing a statement of my account according to your instructions.
