My Lord Duke.

I beg to bring the following to the notice
of your Grace, with a view to your grace
granting me the proper amount of leave
due to me.

I have served 66 months as Assistant
Catering Manager on the Uganda Railway
at Nairobi, and by the attached papers
your grace will see, that I am only granted
5 months leave in lieu of nearly 12 months
that is due to me.

Having served two tours of 30 months each
and 5 months over, I am entitled to two
full periods of return leave and single
vacation leave for 5 months. That is, total
312 $\frac{1}{2}$ days.

One of the Assistant Chief Accountants stated
that I am entitled to an additional 80 days
to the 160 granted, but the leave regulations
plainly state that 312 $\frac{1}{2}$ days is what is due
to me. No alteration of my leave paper have
been made in the pay sheet sent to the Dash.
which states that my leave terminates on the 31-10-23
I also applied as per the leave regulations for
the passage money to book my wife and my
passage to England via Durban. This
was refused although granted to men who
were discharged for irregular conduct.
My leave is also rated to commence from the

3.5.23 although my passage had not been booked at that date. The commencing date of my leave should be the date I land in Durban.

There is another matter I would call your Grace's attention to. That is, there is no medical attention arranged for men taking leave in South Africa. It has already cost me a month's salary, owing to my suffering from 6½ years accumulation of malaria fever. As I have been sick for the month I have been here, could not medical attention be arranged here as in England and India.

Discharge Certificate.

Other men who have returned home at one time given their discharge certificate. I have not received mine. I presume that it will be forwarded to me. (See letter 3.11.29 of 16.3.23) at the expiration of my leave.

Finally Your Grace will pardon me troubling you, and that Your Grace will give instructions for my leave pay and passage money for my journey to England, to be paid into the Standard Bank of South Africa, to allow me to come to England before my leave expires.

I would also beg to enquire if there are any vacancies in the Catering Dept. of the Nigerian Railways. I have enclosed correspondence in original which will you please return when perused.

In my case, Mr Hawkin, Forestry Dept. was only granted single vacation leave, on his completed term of service. On appealing to the head of his department, was granted the full term of return leave, although returning.

In my case, my letter as you will note by the attached paper, was not forwarded to the General Manager of the Uganda Railway. But was dealt with by a clerk, who is new to the service and has very little knowledge of the leave rules.

Examples of Leave and Passages granted recently

Mr George Stropp. Foreman Blacksmith. discharged for irregular conduct. and continually under the influence of liquor. joined the Uganda Railway from the Mechanical Transport-unit from South Africa. Granted leave to England, via South Africa. Passage money given to book his own and wife's passage. A month's money in lieu of notice also given.

Mr Russell. Foreman Moulder. discharged from the service after a few months service, owing to his insobriety and being absent from duty. granted a passage to India. and leave due also. a month pay in lieu of notice.

Mr Conradius. Assistant Traffic Inspector. given full return leave. due on several terms of service although not leaving India.

Driver Farrow. discharged for derailing a train whilst under the influence of liquor. and causing an enormous amount of damage. given a month's pay in lieu of notice and the return leave due and passage to England.
