Sir,

In reply to Mr. Thomas' despatch, S. 5771, confidential (4), of the 3rd November, 1924, I have the honour to inform you that the intention of paragraph 19 (4) of the Asiatic Leave Rules is to regularise as far as is practicable from the side of the Administration the granting of non-accumulative leave to the Railway staff, and at the same time to permit of such latitude in the taking of leave as is considered sensible. It was thought that these two objects could best be secured by not allowing regular leave to be taken until after a month's service condition insisting that non-accumulative leave must be taken during the calendar year in which it falls up or otherwise be forfeited. This latter provision approximates to the practice obtaining in all branches of the Service and it can readily be understood that if the Asiatic staff generally had the right to regular non-accumulative leave in order to participate in any particular festivities the working of the railway could be very inconveniently dislocated.

This rule applies to Africans and in the case of Europeans the general procedure is that on first appointment 11 months and on return from leave 6 months have to be served before non-accumulative leave is granted. In order to remove any ground for complaint of differentiation the General Manager has agreed to leave being granted after 11 months' service to Non-Europeans also and Clause 10 (A) of the Circular will be amended accordingly.

3. With regard to the enquiries contained in Paragraph 3 of the despatch under reply, I would state that the reasons for the reduction in the number of Asiatics employed are :

- (i). The introduction of more efficient organization and elimination of waste, thereby enabling the General Manager to dispense with staff.
- (ii). The steady displacement of Asiatics by Africans (by this is not meant individual replacement so much as progress in the training of natives and the consequent increase in numbers employed to the economic advantage of the Administration). It is impossible to allocate the proportion in which each of these factors has contributed to the economies effected.

The attached comparative statement submitted by Mr. Felling will show how real this displacement is.

4. In examining the figures contained in the attached statement due consideration should be given to the increased capital expenditure and to the large expansion in traffic which has taken place during the period to which the table refers. Had it not been

for those two factors the reduction in Asiatic staff



MURKINIAN FRONTIER

I do not doubt the proper authorities will send to you, presently, a copy of their most recent agreement (or proposed agreement) with the Italians on this question, and their instructions in that connection.

I happen to know, however, that Mr. Bottomley is exceedingly busy at the present moment, and on this matter, as to other present Survey operations, I dare hints to you.

The meridian, starting from the point situated at M. Kern, is to run due South until it crosses the parallel of 41 degrees South 45 minutes. That, you will remember, was our proposal. The line is then to run for a South-Eastern direction, the point situated about 15 miles due North of the point on the coast etc. Final negotiations will, I am certain, confirm those points.

You will note the latter provision which is a very wise concession on the part of the authorities that care to the wishes of the Italians.

With your very promises to cooperate and that all in well, I will look forward with the greatest of interest to hearing from you.


