With reference to the revision of salaries, I understand that the Governors of the three Dependencies concerned are to meet towards the end of this year or early next year to discuss the matter. in the knowledge that all three Governments ar nerged as to the necessity for increased salaries. are concerned to think that the new scale may not be made effective until the Secretary of State's decision will not be till well on in han been made known. This This delay is unfortunately inevitable, as the Secretary of State has directed that all three Governments should confer. If each lovernment could have noted independently, the matter as far as Uganda concerned would have been settled long before this. The delay is therefore due to circumstances which this The case for increased Government could not control. the increase is long overdue salaries is admitted: it seems therefore only fair and reasonable that officials should not be prejudiced by ruither delay

2. There discussed this matter with the Chief Secretary, the Attorney General, the Treasurer and the Director of Medical and Sanitary Services, and with their concurrence I would respectfully suggest to Your. Excellency that the Secretary of State be now asked to give retraspective effect to the revised scale and that its introduction should not depend upon the date on which he arrives at his decision. Forth your renommandations on new salary scales and we are deeply appracrative of the interest which you as minimum, took in the matter. We feel, therefore assured of your sympathy. We are confident that Your Excellency cannot but feel convinced of the force and justice of our suggestion that the new scale should have retrospective effect and we trust that you will recommend this to the Secretary of State. We are profoundly anxious lest the Secretary of State may decide that the new scale shall take effect from the date of his decision. It is no emaggeration to say that such a ruling would cause a general feeling of dismay, a dismay proportionate to the very proposed hardship involved. Your Excellency will, no trust rake such a representations as will dispend our anxiety.

There is one further point to which reference should be made. I understand that when salaries were revised in Nigeria - this is a matter upon which Your Excellency has accurate information - it was decided that officers entitled to retire were to be deemed to have been in receipt of the increased rate of pay for the two or three years necessary to give them the full pension applicable to their new pay. We think that this principle may fairly be applied here, having regard to the fact that the increases of salary are so long overdue.
