Dropped in by Mr. Leggett, who said he had been invited to speak at the meeting of the Kenyan Society on Saturday evening. He said he would be unable to do so, as he had other engagements. He said he was sorry about it, but he could not change his attitude.

Theodore New sent me a telegram last night and the following expt for what appears to be square brackets represents I think the result of the discussion.

It is proposed to have a formal opening ceremony at which the Secretary of State will be present and therefore the dates are limited through the Secretary of State's absence and the Christmas holidays. The 6th of January is the only suitable date to choose.


