Sir,

I have the honour to forward to you at the request of the Civil Servants Association copies of three letters received from them on the subject of the payment of War Bonus to Officers while on vacation leave.

1. I discussed this matter with my Executive Council and concurred with the following recommendation of the Govt. Councillors:

"Correspondence relating to reply to be addressed to the Civil Service Association shall be left to Government as unable to approve the suggestion in view of the fact that the Mr. Bowles was incorporated in salary on 1st April, 1927, and that although the cost of living in Kenya may have risen between that date and the end of 1929, the official index figures published in 1930 in England show that it is now falling."

No reply was sent in these terms.

3. At present the Association desires the joint group before you, I am forwarding the correspondence but request that I be enabled to carry the action to completion before the end of the year.

I have the honour to acknowledge the receipt of your letter No. E. 15458/96 dated the 8th ultimo on the subject of the payment of War Bonus on the English rate to Officers on leave in England and to reply under the direction of the General Committee of the Association as follows:-

2. It appears from English newspapers that a further award has recently been made by Whitley Council which again increases the emoluments of Civil Servants and my Committee is satisfied that the position of British East Africa Civil Servants on leave in England compares very unfavorably with that of officials of the Home service on similar grades.

(2) While England is still a highly cheaper place for residence than British East Africa it must be realized that Officers on leave in England are not residents but visitors and the cost of living for visitors is a very different matter. They must find accommodation (for few, except bachelors, can spend their leave with friends) and the difficulty and cost of so doing for a short stay is great in the conditions prevailing as to housing.

4. Officers on leave must do a certain amount of travelling which is unavoidable and expensive, they must occasionally stay at hotels and pay the heavy rates demanded for accommodation and for any little service rendered there or elsewhere.

5. The majority of Officers on leave after extended

men of service need more medical attention, ~~and~~ ^{and} food,
and medicines than they received free in East Africa, for
themselves, their wives and families, and they have to
refit for a further tour of service; these also are items
of heavy additional expense.

6. These Officers receive no compensation for the loss
of a house or house allowance, of free medical attendance
~~and~~ ^{and} medicines, and of duty allowance where such is drawn
in East Africa.

7. The foregoing are points which appear to have been
lost sight of in deciding to pay Officers on leave at
theirsterling rates of pay and also in your letter under reply.

S. My Committee desire to assure His Excellency the
Acting Governor that the evidence before them proves
conclusively that Officers on leave are in very urgent need
of assistance and venture again to request that suitable
representations may be made to the Secretary of State for
the Colonies.

PAYMENT OF WAR BONUS AT ENGLISH RATES TO
OFFICERS OF THIS COLONY WHEN ON LEAVE.

I have the honour to refer to previous correspondence on the above subject and to request that the matter may be brought to the notice of His Excellency the Governor.

2. Now that Officers on leave draw their sterling salaries only without any allowance whatsoever, the statement in para 5 of my letter of 29th May last applies with even greater force - and "that Officers on leave are in very urgent need of assistance" cannot be denied.

3. Since April 1st 1920, the dates from which the revised scales of salaries came into operation, the English rates of War Bonus have been increased on two occasions to enable English Civil Servants to meet the rise in the cost of living. These increases took effect on July 1st 1920 and November 1st 1920 and provided Officers - £400-2500 per annum with a bonus at the rate of £237-74-0 per annum from the former date and of £272-18-0 per annum from the latter date. As during this period the payment of bonus on leave to Civil Servants of this Colony has been discontinued, while previously the rates of bonus paid to Home Civil Servants were higher than those paid to East African Officers, it is requested that the Government may favourably reconsider the matter and cause English rates of bonus to be paid to Officers of this Colony during the periods of their leave.

I have the honour to acknowledge with thanks the above-mentioned communication and to reply under the direction of my Committee as follows.

2. It is still felt that the claim for payment of War Bonus at English rates to Officers on leave is a just one, and it is regretted that the Executive Council was unable to recommend the concession requested.

3. An Officer loses the 50% local allowance - which is in the nature of a War Bonus, - as soon as he embarks on the homeward voyage to take his vacation leave and although the cost of living in England is now some $2\frac{1}{2}$ times what it was in July 1914, he is granted no compensating allowance during his leave. The meagre and admittedly insufficient increases in the rates of pay which took effect last year do not cover the greatly increased expenditure which Officers have to meet during their leave and are quite inadequate for the greater cost of refitting, for a further tour of service.

4. My Committee desires therefore that the correspondence on the subject may be forwarded to the Secretary of State for the Colonies in accordance with the latter portion of the minute of Executive Council.
