My dear Panninen,

I have your letter of yesterday containing a question from a despatch from the Governor of Kenya on the question of private practice by Government Veterinary Officers. I do not have such of our records as I have been able to look up but we have had a system under which fees for the Government Veterinary Officers to private persons were paid to Government Revenue. Our present system is by Notices, of which I attach a copy. The fees are paid to the Government Veterinary Officer himself, that is to say, that to the extent indicated in the Notices our Government Veterinary Surgeons are allowed private practice.

If you would like me to make enquiry as to whether in any other way there was a system of crediting the fees to Government Revenue, which system proved a failure, I will gladly do so; but this of course would take time.

I have the honour to refer to Mr. Tom Viscovat's
letter of the 10th of 1920.

The subject of the enjoyment of private practice
by Veterinary Officers and to inform
me I have recently had the matter under
consideration.

The instructions contained in the despatch
under reference were that fees might be charged
for veterinary assistance to private persons, but
that such fees should accrue to Government.

No action was taken to give effect to this
policy, the apparent reason being that difficulties
were anticipated in the collection of the fees,
which it was considered would in any case be too
small to repay the trouble of collection.

After discussion with my Executive Council
I have come to the conclusion that Veterinary Officers
should be allowed private practice, being permitted
to charge and retain fees in the same manner
as Medical Officers.

there should be accorded to the Veterinary Officers appointed to that post, which is felt that while the Veterinary Officers have generally refused to give assistance, it is only reasonable that they should be remunerated for so doing.

6. The Department has been considering the possibility of charging fees for the services rendered to a Director of a State and the staff of Veterinary Officers and there is no doubt that the Veterinary treatment lends itself to some extent to the privilege. I anticipate that, as a result of the introduction of fees, more time will remain at the disposal of the Department for the treatment of zoonotic disease.

7. I should mention that a Resolution recently passed by the Government of Madhya Pradesh to the effect that the Veterinary Officers should be appointed under the provisions of the Madhya Pradesh Veterinary Act, 1906, reflects the opinion of the Government on the subject.

8. It is considered impossible to lay down a schedule of the fees to be charged, I am however satisfied

PRELIMINARY ATTENDANCE

The public are hereby informed that notice has been given that Officers are permitted to conduct services rendered in connection with (a) examinations of animals for somnolence, (b) treatment of diseases of livestock of a non-contagious and non-infectious nature, (c) surgical operations such as castrations, dehorning and treatment of wounds and (d) treatment of the ailments of livestock.

If a Veterinary Officer is employed by the Government in attendance at a place he shall pay the usual Government rates for the hire of a motor car and he shall be entitled to recover from the Government the actual attendance.

It is hereby notified that Government has the first claim upon the time of the Veterinary Officer for services under the provisions of Article 107 of the Constitution Act. of India. Private practice as Veterinary Officers are allowed to perform must not interfere with their official duties.
