Early in 1919, before the possibility of cession had been communicated to the Officers administering that part. a meeting was neld between the Officer-in-Charge of the Gurre and the Officer-in-Charge of the Marchan and the previous policy was reiterated. the Marchan being told quite definitely that Melka Re was their absolute limit westward. The boundary line proposed was drawn specifically with this object that it should take in no Marchan country. There has never been any question of any of the Marchan being left in the territory which is to remain British. To allow them any footing beyond this proposed line would be to perpetrate the grossest injustice on the Gurre.
