Your letter of the 6th instant, No. 15/358 to hand
The presume the heading "without prejudice" to be an error
as your letter as merely a notice that action will be taken
if your client does not accept the Gevernment's draft Lease
within seven days without amendment.

We had already communicated with the Men'ble the Coief Secertary to the effect that our client wishes the question as to the Market Lease tobe reffered to the Secertary of State for the Colonies.

There era several points in the drfat lease which require combideration and which we are not yet in a position to deal with.

In the graft submitted there is no adequate description of parcels, and further there is reference to a plan, but no copy of the plan has been submitted.

Wehave written the Hent ble the Land Officer for these further particulars.

We quite admit that the question of the emission of the clause dealing with the right to menopoly is the one so to which there appears at present to be a deadlock betwee our client and the Government, but we would point out that the maission of the clause in question could not offer the rights of the woverment if no monepely exists.

Our elient is not asking that a clause be inserted giving him a right to a monopoly but he naturally objects to singing away what he consider s to be his rights by allowing an unnecessary clause to be inserted in his lease He instructs us to make it perfectly clear that, in asking for the emission of this clause, he is prepared to abide by the decision of the Secretary of State for the Colonies as to whether he is entitled to a monopoly.

We are writing the Chief Secretary to the same offect and a copy of this letter will be forwarded to the Secretary of State.

In reference to our recent interview, I have seen Mr. A. H. Jeevanjee and find that, for the purpose of mm settling these long outstanding questions, he is prepared to putforward certain effers of settlement which appear to be more reasonable:-

Re MARKET

Mr. Jeevanjee has expanded well ever Rs. 100,000 en these buildings and the plet is a most valuable enc. It is also certain that if the market were run by the Municipalitic could be made a most paying proposition-whereas under the present arrangement of dual century, this is not the case.

We would point out that at present the Municipality are making more out of the Market bhan the ewner who has expanded such a large smount of money on buildings and up-keep and, further, that we have had the valuation checked by a compentent European Valor who informs us that it is beliew the value at which he could assess it.

HE: TOWE HALL (COMUT BUILDINGS)

This is one of the most valuable plots in the Township, and a reference to the correspondence and draft Lease can leave no doubt that Mr. Jeevanjee was not prepared to erect the building on the same terms as ordinary residential buildings.

The final draft agreed wash signed on behalf of our client and approved and witnessed by Measus Sanderson and Margraves. There is, therefore no doubt that Mr. Jesuages is empitted to a lease of this valuable plot.

To accommedate the Government Wr. Jewanjee is prepayed to release his claim to the lease for so leng as the plot may be required for genuine Government purposed, and to scopt in exchange a suitable plot classware, but preferably in Sixth Avenue, where we understand a plot is available, and was actually ear-marked for this exchange.
